

ITALIAN WORKERS TO KEEP CONTROL

Socialists Submit Drafts of Law to Be Considered by Parliament at Next Session

DEMANDS ARE RESISTED

 Milan, Sept. 15.—Plans for a law providing for the collaboration of industrial men in the management of industrial plants, which will be presented at the next session of the Italian Parliament, have been placed in the hands of a commission appointed by Socialist members of the House of Deputies. Leaders of the workmen insist that the agreement with employers must submit the management of technical departments, finance and offices for the engagement and dismissal of men. They assert that such powers should be exercised by organizations appointed by labor unions. Leaders declare that the country will continue until employers' privileges are suppressed and the new rights of labor acknowledged.

While a majority of employers strongly resist the workmen's scheme for assisting in the work of management, there is an important section which seems to be accepted on general lines, in order that the conflict going on at present may be ended. This element would reserve discussion of details, which would be submitted to a commission composed of representatives of employers and workers.

Negotiations between the two sides in the conflict have been rendered more difficult by the work of irresponsible agitators. At Verona a mob of railway men and street-car employees, headed by Signor Scarabello, Socialist deputy, invaded the Rossi factory, the employees of which had refused to occupy the works. Scarabello is declared to have given the Rossi family one minute in which to

abandon its adjacent home. Rossi objected, saying he had a sick son and that the physician in attendance refused to take the responsibility in allowing him to be removed.

Scarabello undertakes the responsibility, and he is said to have covered Rossi with a revolver until the works and the house were cleared.

MANY POLICEMEN DIE IN FIGHTS IN KOREA

Japanese and Native Forces Suffer Heavy Losses at Pyongyang

Tokyo, Sept. 15.—(By A. P.)—Press advices from Korea say that many Koreans and Japanese police have been killed in attacks by Koreans on the police. The authorities have announced the lifting of the censorship on recent events in Korea, thus permitting publication of details.

Fighting between the Koreans and the police in which guns were used, reached a climax about the time of the visit of the American congressmen, with the police at Pyongyang the center of the disturbances.

According to one report, seventeen Korean policemen in a town near Pyongyang struck in sympathy with Koreans who were seeking to present petitions to the visiting congressmen.

Four of the striking policemen were dismissed and at Pyongyang a Korean was arrested charged with trying to present two petitions to the Americans, one entitled "The Great Korean People," and another "The Great Korean Republic," both of which had been drawn up by Korean women.

The police now claim control of the situation.

Millerand to Meet Lloyd George
 Paris, Sept. 15.—(By A. P.)—Premier Millerand will meet Premier Lloyd George, of Great Britain, at Biarritz during the next fortnight, according to a dispatch to the Excelsior from Aix-les-Bains, where M. Millerand conferred with Premier Giolitti, of Italy, last Sunday and Monday.

LE PRETESE DEGLI OPERAI IN ITALIA

Per una Legge che Provveda alla Partecipazione Degli Operai al Maneeggiamento Degli Stabilimenti

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Milano, 14 settembre.—I piani per una legge che provveda alla cooperazione degli operai al maneeggiamento degli stabilimenti industriali, che dovrà essere presentata nella prossima sessione del Parlamento, sono stati affidati ad una commissione nominata dai membri del partito socialista alla Camera dei Deputati. I capi degli operai insistono che un accordo con i proprietari degli stabilimenti deve ammettere gli operai all'ingegneria dei dipartimenti tecnici, finanziari e degli uffici per l'ammissione o il licenziamento dei lavoratori. Essi asseriscono che tali poteri dovranno essere esercitati dalle organizzazioni nominate dalle unioni di lavoro. I capi dichiarano che l'occupazione degli stabilimenti attraverso il paese durerà fino a che i privilegi dei proprietari saranno soppressi e che una intesa sia raggiunta sui nuovi diritti degli operai.

Mentre una maggioranza di proprietari resiste fortemente allo schema degli operai per l'ingegneria sul maneeggiamento del lavoro, via un'importante parte la quale appoggia e suggerisce che lo schema degli operai sia accettato nelle linee generali, allo scopo

di mettere fine al presente conflitto. Questa parte di proprietari vuol riservare la discussione dei dettagli, la quale dovrebbe essere sottoposta ad un commissione composta di rappresentanti di proprietari di stabilimenti e di rappresentanti di operai.

I negoziati tra le due parti in conflitto sono divenuti più difficili per il lavoro di irresponsabili agitatori. A Verona una turba di ferrovieri e tramvieri, capitanati da Scarabello, un deputato socialista, invasero lo stabilimento Rossi, gli operai del quale avevano rifiutato di occupare i lavori. Si dice che Scarabello diede un minuto di tempo alla famiglia del Rossi di abbandonare la sua casa adiacente allo stabilimento. Il Rossi fece delle osservazioni dicendo che aveva un figlio malato e che i medici non volevano prendere la responsabilità per muoverlo.

"Noi assumiamo la responsabilità."

avrebbe dichiarato lo Scarabello e si dice che dopo spiano' la rivoltella contro il Rossi, fino a che lo stabilimento e la casa non fu evacuato.

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
