

ARMY TO AID LEGION GIVE OUT MEDALS

Distribution of Victory Tokens
Has Progressed Slowly in
Philadelphia District

NAVAL POST TO MEET

Assignment of army field clerks to the posts of the American Legion in this city to assist veterans in preparing applications for victory medals has been determined upon by the army recruiting service in an effort to stimulate the applications.

The announcement that clerks will be available for such work at meetings of posts of the Legion was made today by Captain F. P. Todd, of the recruiting office, 1345 Arch street. Word has been sent to all the Legion commanders, calling to their attention the offer of Captain Todd, and it is anticipated that the posts will co-operate with the army service in expediting the work.

In order to avail themselves of the services of the field clerks, it will be required that a typewriter be provided on the evening of the post meeting, so that the typewritten parts of the applications may be filled in. The army field clerks will have authority to approve the applications immediately upon the presentation of the honorable discharge by the former service man.

Posts of the Legion have been urged to circulate their membership so that the largest possible number may be served in this way. Henry H. Houston Post, No. 3, of Germantown, will be the first to take advantage of the offer by Captain Todd. At the meeting tonight the veterans will present their dis-

charges, and victory medal forms will be prepared in the clubhouse. To September, 12,000 applications had been received in this district, which includes the adjoining counties in Pennsylvania and contiguous counties in New Jersey. It is estimated that there are about 125,000 former service men in the district entitled to the medals.

All veterans of the R. G. Baker Naval Post, No. 1, G. A. R., are invited to attend the meeting of the David and Irving Clair Post, No. 37, Thursday evening, September 16, at 8:30 o'clock, at 2723 Columbia avenue.
