

# 22 SALOONKEEPERS MUST FACE TRIAL

### Federal Grand Jury Also Acts in Chester and Lancaster Prohibition Cases

## DROP CHARGES AGAINST 13

The first wholesale batch of indictments against saloonkeepers and their bartenders for violating national prohibition was returned by the federal grand jury to United States District Judge Thompson today.

The grand jury indicted twenty-two Philadelphia saloonkeepers, two of Lancaster, and five of Chester for selling intoxicants, and in addition returned indictments against twenty-three bartenders. One of the surprises of the report by the grand jury was the ignoring of thirteen bills of indictment for liquor sales, nine against saloonkeepers and four against bartenders. Of those given a clean bill of health by the action of the grand jury, three of Philadelphia saloonkeepers, three of Lancaster, one of Chester and one of Reading.

# DISCOUNT ON TAXES MAY BE INCREASED

### Mayor and Kendrick Confer on Plan to Get Quick Cash for City

## 1 PER CENT ALLOWED NOW

In order to encourage the payment of taxes early in the year, city and county officials are considering a 2 1/2 per cent discount, instead of the existing 1 per cent discount for payments made in the first three months of the year.

A conference on the subject was held today in the Mayor's office. Those present were the Mayor, City Controller Hadley, Receiver of Taxes Kendrick, Assistant Receiver Keely and Francis F. Burch, chairman of Council's finance committee.

The present scale of discounts and penalties follows: January, February and March, 1 per cent discount; April, three-quarters of 1 per cent discount; May, one-half of 1 per cent discount; June, one-quarter of 1 per cent discount; July and August, flat payments; September, 1 per cent penalty; October, 2 per cent penalty; November, 3 per cent penalty; December, 4 per cent penalty.

A substitute scale which may be adopted follows: January, February and March, 2 1/2 per cent discount; April 1 per cent discount; May and June, flat payments; graduated penalties after July 31.

Mr. Kendrick informed the Mayor that penalties exacted last year totaled \$452,748, while discounts allowed amounted to \$80,248.

In 1919, according to Mr. Kendrick, 19 per cent of the taxes were paid in the first three months; 11 per cent from April to July 31; 55 per cent in August and 15 per cent from September to December.

A 2 1/2 per cent discount was allowed in 1912. In the first six months of that year 44 per cent of the taxes had been collected, compared with 29 per cent in the first six months of 1919.
