NEW YORK BANK STATEMENT DANIELS DENIES

Enormous Increase in Loans Due to the Week's Extensive Financial Operations

The week's extensive financial operations, incidental to the income tax payments and Liberty loan interest, were strongly reflected in today's New York bank statement. This was indicated in the remarkable expansion in loans and discounts of \$112,981,000, and the jump in demand deposits of \$85,067,000. Yet was evident that the banks were able to fortify the reserve position, as indicated by the increased credit reserve in Federal Reserve Bank of \$0.-627,000. While this gain was partly offset by the largely increased liabilities. offset by the largely increased liabilities, the excess reserve was only cut \$4,-763,790, reducing the actual surplusabove legal requirements to \$19,315,410. The street looked for a much more unfavorable showing.
