EXTRA SEATS FOR BIG EASTON GAME

Temporary Stands to Be Built for Lehigh-Lafayette Battle This Season

Easton, Pa., Sept. 23.—Plans are being completed for the increasing of the seating capacity of March Field to take care of the large crowd which is expected to witness the annual gridiron struggle between Lafayette College and Lehigh University this fall on the local athletic field.

The present stands on March Field are too small to handle a gathering such as those which have attended the Lehigh-Lafayette games in the last four years.

Erection of 7500 additional seats would be sufficient to accommodate a crowd of 13,500. The seats, if erected, will be at north and south ends of the field behind the goal posts.

The return of Joe Williams and Frank Schwab considerably bolstered the Lafayette line.

Yet it cannot be said that Williams and Schwab are sure of retaining their positions and starting the opening game of the season with Muhlenberg on
