

PARTED FROM WIFE, MAN KILLS HIMSELF

Victim Is Found in Father-in-Law's Home—Dies Later in Hospital

BEEN DRINKING, POLICE TOLD

Anthony Grego, thirty-one years old, died in the Misericordia Hospital at 2:30 o'clock this morning from a bullet wound in the temple after being removed from the home of his father-in-law at 2506 Sansom street.

A drinking bout preceded Grego's death, according to his wife, Mamie, who was in an upstairs room when the shooting occurred. She had been separated from Grego for a week, she told the police.

Henry Jacob Forbes, forty-six years old, father of Mrs. Grego, in whose home the tragedy occurred, and Allen Corcoran, thirty-eight years, who made his home with Forbes, were drinking with Grego a short time before the shooting, they told the police.

They claim Grego shot himself. The pair were given a hearing before Magistrate Harris in the Thirty-second street and Woodland avenue station this morning and held in \$500 bail apiece to await the action of the coroner.

Shortly after midnight Policeman Hundermark, of the Fifty-fifth and Pine streets station, was patrolling his beat when Forbes rushed up to him and said a man had been shot at 2506 Sansom street.

The policeman went inside the house and found Corcoran an ambulance and Lad Grego taken to the hospital. He died two hours after being admitted, without regaining consciousness.

The police closely questioned Forbes and Corcoran. They admitted they had been drinking with Grego, but insisted they had nothing to do with the shooting. Forbes said Grego told him

4 YOUNG 'CRUSOES' LOSE THEIR ISLAND

They Didn't Have a 'Friday,' So They Stocked Larder at Expense of Nearby Store

The bubble of romance for four boys, "castaways" on a "tropical island," was punctured last night by an alert patrolman of the Branchtown police station.

The youngsters, missing from their homes for a week, were discovered living in the one-story frame clubhouse of the Morning Newspaper Carriers' Association, Chelton and Ogontz avenues.

The snug building is set in a grove of trees. The imaginations of the boys had converted it into an island of the South Sea while the surrounding trees to them represented a jungle.

The "castaways" were Joseph Fagan, fourteen years old, Jenkintown; Richard Zilinski, eleven years old, Washington lane and Stenton avenue; James McLaughlin, eleven years old, 1308 East Rittenhouse street, and Joseph Smallberger, twelve years old, 1327 Price street.

Patrolman Gallena, of the Branchtown station, saw a light in the clubhouse and discovered the boys. A good supper had been cooked on the clubhouse stove and canned meats, fruits, candies, cakes and bread were heaped on shelves.

According to the police, the boys admitted they had commandeered the food supplies from a chain store at Chelton and Stenton avenues. They said they forced a store door last Sunday afternoon.

Before locating their "tropical island" the boys said they had been living in a vacant house near Sixty-fifth avenue and Twenty-first street. The "castaways" were sent to the House of Detention.
