

"IN-LAWS" WRECK SOCIETY ROMANCE

Mrs. William Barton French Wins Decree From Husband. Gets \$50,000 Yearly

New York, Oct. 1.—William Barton French, society leader and clubman, last night verified a report that his wife had received a final decree of divorce.

He placed the blame on the shoulders of "the in-laws," saying there "were too many of them." Where the divorce was granted or on what ground, Mr. French declined to stipulate.

The Frenchs were married in December 4, 1916, at St. Bartholomew's Church, Mr. French said he received the divorce papers last night.

For several months society gossiping had it that the clubman and his wife were living apart. A few days ago it was said that the final decree was in operation and that Mr. French was contemplating another venture into matrimony. The name of a prominent woman, now separated from her husband, has been mentioned as Mr. French's prospective bride.

Mr. French puffed a pipe in his

apartment of the Metropolitan Club, Sixty-sixth street and Fifth avenue, and related his experiences with his "in-laws." Mrs. French was formerly Miss Jeanne Emmet, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry C. Emmet, of 39 East Seventy-second street. He said: "I have always loved Jeanne and always will. I have hopes that we will be together some time again."

"But it was a question of too many 'in-laws' who stepped between us and our happiness."

"The Emmets are ambitious socially. They have the idea that no one is quite as good as they are. Last February a climax came when I enjoyed a good dinner at the Emmet home. Other socially prominent guests were there."

"I appeared in a gray tuxedo suit that was entirely comfortable and to my liking. It was not to the liking of the Emmets, who, with their guests, were in full evening dress. They raised the very dickens with me about my garb. I resented this and announced I never would enter their home again. I didn't."

"My mother and myself spent three years in France driving an ambulance."

According to Mr. French the wife has the custody of their three-year-old daughter. Mr. French declares that "so eager was the thought of the Emmet's concentrated on money" that they requested him to "settle \$500,000 on Jeanne" before the fashionable wedding took place. He added:

"I gave her yearly enough interest on this amount to total \$50,000. Under the divorce I have settled an additional \$12,000 on the little girl. And the child is taken care of, too, independently of this amount."
