

Y. W. C. A. HAS NEW GERMANTOWN CAFE

75 Guests Attend Banquet and Listen to Informal Speeches Regarding Cafeteria

Seventy-five guests met last night at the Young Women's Christian Association Building, at 6820 Germantown avenue, and, gathered about the banquet board, with a few informal speeches opened the new cafeteria.

The restaurant is due to the generosity of Mrs. William J. McLean, honorary president of the board of man-

agers, and in its tasteful decoration radiates the good cheer of the association. Although the Y. W. C. A. Building is for the advancement of the interests of young women, and for their diversion, the cafeteria is open to men.

In fact, there is a smoking and rest room for the men. The main dining room will seat 500 persons, and in addition there is a smaller room for private dinner parties. There are, also, small side-rooms, screened off from the main dining hall, where little parties may sit and dine in greater privacy than is the case in the large main hall.

It is planned to serve meals, giving choice of two kinds of meats and three vegetables, very moderately priced indeed. Tea will be served from 3 until 5 o'clock; dinner hours being from 6 o'clock until 8.

There were a few informal speeches, Mrs. John McArthur Harris introducing the toastmaster, Colonel Sheldon Potter, after an invocation by the Rev. Dr. W. Beatty Jennings. Colonel Potter said that, being a Christian association,

this must of necessity be a joyous place, and the aspect of the rooms bore him out. He rejoiced, he said, that he had such an institution in Germantown.

Director of Welfare Ernest Tustin told of the need for Christian women more than for Christian men, as it is a woman who first teaches a little child to say its prayers at her knee and watches over its tender childhood years when its character is being formed.
