Director of Public Health Urges National Conference of Legal Aid Officers

Tustin, of the Department of Public Welfare, urged a national conference of legal aid officers of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars and representatives of welfare organisations in the Chamber of Commerce, Widener Building, last night, to utilize the facilities of the newly created Bureau of Legal Aid and thus assist this arm of the municipal government to perform its duty to the government to perform its duty to the

"The Bureau of Legal Aid can exert the greatest possible influence in behalf of 100 per cent Americanism," declared the director. "It can and should foster the American spirit. And let me tell you that the hursey is only doing its plain that the bureau is only doing its plain duty when it helps the service men.

Those who gave up their business and bandicapped their future to fight for the country deserve the very best that we can give them."

The conference was held for the purpose of outling for the hearest of for

pose of outlining for the benefit of for-mer service men the scope of work of the bureau, and inviting the attention of the world war veterans to the facil-ities which the bureau affords in solv-ing legal difficulties for worthy and ing legal difficulties for worthy and needy applicants. It was the first of a series of meetings which will be conducted by the bureau to impress upon the community the existence of the bureau and the purposes it seeks to carry into effect.

Federal legislation was recommended which would make possible the treatment by the public health service of service men whose injuries occur during a period of hospitalisation or during the time a veteran is receiving training from the federal board of vocational

George W. Braden, of the Y. M. C. A., pointed out that a number of cases had been brought to him in which men were injured while undergoing govern-ment training and whose injuries thus received could not legally be treated by the government. This situation is due to the recent ruling of the secretary

of the treasury.

Speakers at the conference included Walter P. Miller, industrial committee, Chamber of Commerce; Robert Fuller, director of the board of vocational training; Vincent A. Carroll, Nabeto Post, No. 270, American Legion, and Doctor Gowen, public health service.
