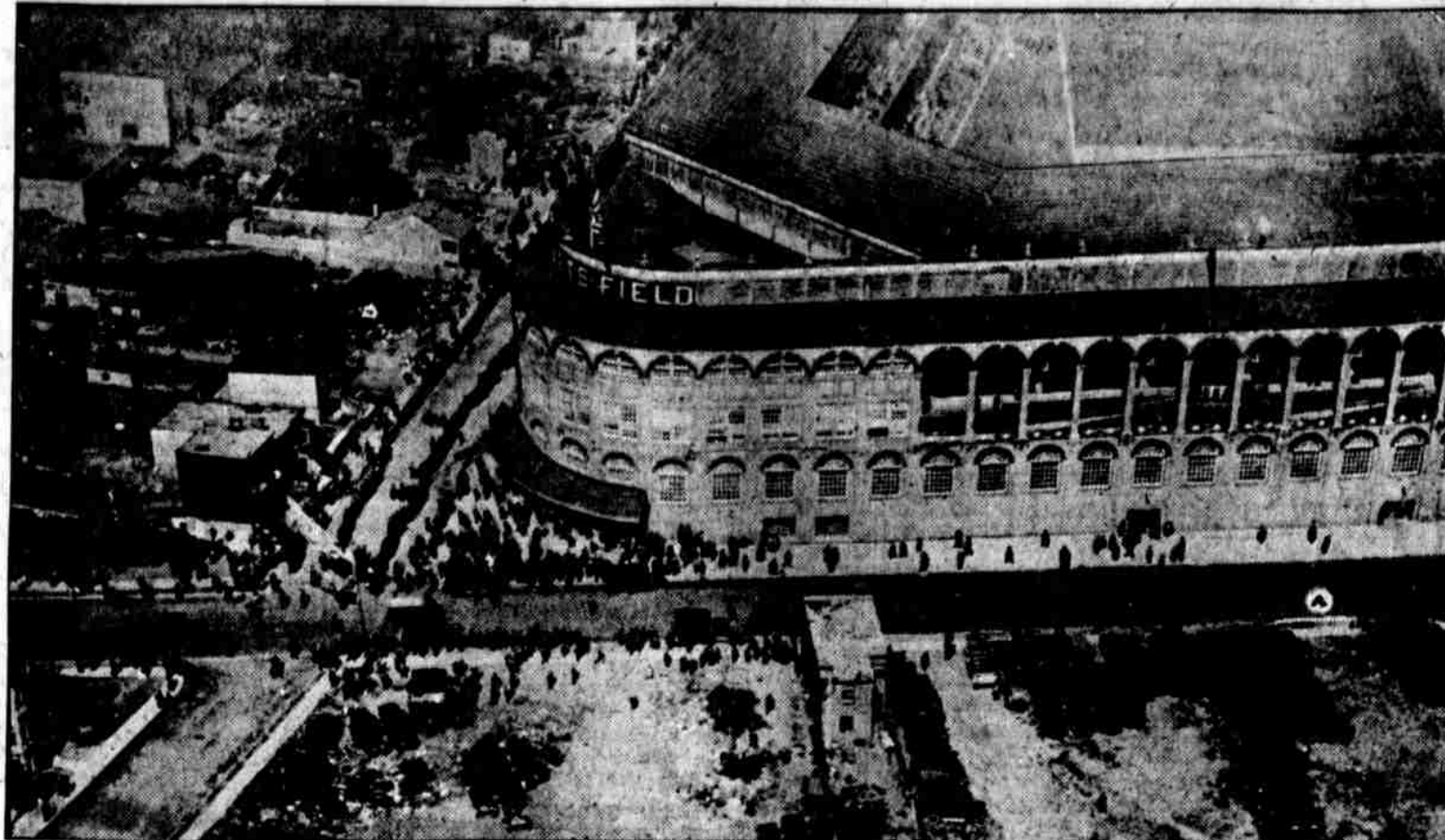




THE FIRST BALL. Mayor Hylan, of New York, started things going by just one toss. A second later Cleveland and Brooklyn were in combat.

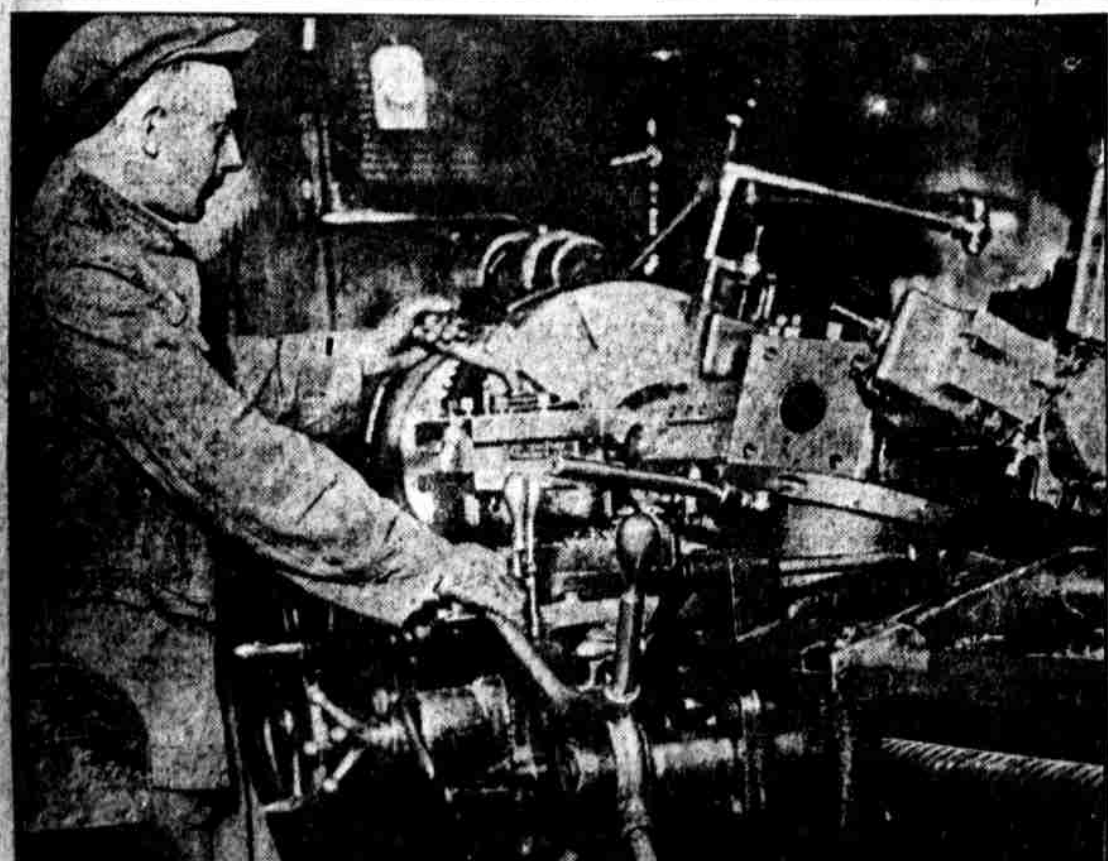
