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STUDENTS BALLOT ON "DEGREE RULE"

Penn Men Vote on Future Athletic Policy in Classrooms Today

"FRATS" VOICE SENTIMENT

Students of the University of Pennsylvania will express their views on the retention of the "degree rule" in athletics on ballots to be circulated in the classrooms today.

The "degree rule" bars from intercollegiate competition all students holding degrees from other colleges. This rule is generally recognized in other institutions, but a fight is being made on it at Penn.

The undergraduate body and the degree holders, notably in the law school, seem overwhelmingly in favor of the rule and a big majority for its retention is expected to be rolled up today. The exact number of votes for and against the rule will be reported upon.

Strongest Opposition to the Rule

Only three students in that school voted for the repeal of the rule, the others declaring for its retention so that the University might take no unfair advantage over competitors, or refusing to vote.

Horace M. Barba, Philip Price and Earl G. Harrison, class leaders in the school, signed a statement to the effect that degree students should be so immersed in their work that the time spent trying for athletic teams would appreciably hurt their scholastic standing.

The editorial also quotes Dr. "Joe" McCracken, a famous football star of years ago, who came to the University of Pennsylvania with a degree. He played on the varsity for several years before the enactment of the rule. Doctor McCracken is quoted as saying: "Under the present circumstances I am in favor of the degree rule. All other eastern colleges have adopted that eligibility law, and Pennsylvania should certainly not be the only outlier."

"There has to be some method of equalizing the average age of college players, and the degree rule effects this better than any other method. It seems unfair for Pennsylvania to play older men now that her rivals do not."

Last night every fraternity at the institution met and went on record as being opposed to the repeal of the rule. The decision in every case was virtually unanimous.
