

S. S. CONVENTION DEFIES TOKIO FIRE

Meets in Imperial Theatre, Substituted for Hall Destroyed by Flames

PHILADELPHIAN SPEAKS

By the Associated Press. Tokio, Oct. 7.—Sessions of the world's Sunday school convention, interrupted Tuesday afternoon by the fire which destroyed the great hall where the first meeting was held, were resumed today in the beautiful Imperial Theatre. The playhouse was offered the committee in charge by its founder, Viscount Eichi Shibusawa, president of the American-Japan Association, immediately after the fire. Premier Hara offered the committee the halls of the Japanese Diet, if it was necessary to use them.

Justice MacLaren, of Ontario, vice president of the World's Sunday School Association, presided at yesterday's session and addresses were made by Marjorie Lawrence, of Chicago, and William G. Landes, of Philadelphia. Morning, afternoon and evening conferences were held, and were addressed by prominent persons from many lands.

Other meetings are to be held in Manila, Hong Kong and Canton, and the Sunday school message will be carried to Tokio to Jerusalem through meetings in the Japanese provinces, Korea, China, Singapore, Colombo, India, Ceylon and Palestine.

Delegates to the convention are unanimous in giving particular praise to Miss Caroline Schererowsky, an American missionary and daughter of a former Episcopal bishop of China, for her coolness during Tuesday's fire. It is said her heroism prevented a disastrous stampede at the tabernacle. She spoke commandingly in Japanese, English and secured an orderly retirement of the crowd regardless of risk to herself.

Several persons, including some Americans, were knocked down and walked over during the rush for the exits, but were not badly hurt.

PRINCESS DISGUISES TO WED TRUE LOVE

George Outwits Diplomats by Leaving Country in Peasant Dress to Meet Elizabeth

Paris, Oct. 7.—A battle between love and diplomacy, involving Prince George of Greece, eldest son of former King Constantine, and Princess Elizabeth of Rumania, apparently has ended in a victory for love.

Prince George has arrived in Bucharest after a secret and circuitous journey in disguise in Switzerland. Allied guards were on duty around the Swiss border to prevent the prince from leaving the country, for the diplomats of the allied countries were determined that the marriage should not take place until the alliance arose from the alleged pro-Germanism of the prince.

Few of the former cronies of the prince would have recognized him on his journey from Switzerland. He wore a cloth cap, a cheap sack suit, heavily wrinkled, and heavy shoes. He carried a brown paper suitcase. At Budapest George was joined by his two sisters and Prince Carol of Rumania, who were to be wedding guests, and a valet with a trunkful of clothing.

POLAND-LITHUANIA CALL OFF ARMIES

Cease Military Operations as Allied Mission on Boundary Problem Reaches Suwalki

DRAFT TERMS WITH SOVIET

By the Associated Press. Riga, Oct. 7.—Military operations between the Poles and Lithuanians have ceased, it was announced at Polish headquarters here today. This statement was made in connection with an announcement that the Allied mission on the Polish-Lithuanian question had arrived at Suwalki yesterday.

Polish and Soviet Russian delegates here were today completing the work of framing the final armistice terms between the two governments, and Prince Sapieha, Polish foreign minister, was expected to arrive to take part tomorrow in the ceremonies incident to signing the convention.

TARIFF QUESTIONS DODGED

Financial Committees at Brussels Neutral in Free Trade Fight

Brussels, Oct. 7.—(By A. P.)—Questions relative to free trade and protection were dodged in recommendations made by the four standing committees of the International Financial Conference, presented here today. An international credit system based upon a pledge of the products of borrowing countries as collateral security was urged.

The international trade committee decided the question of tariffs was a political one and, consequently, not within its jurisdiction. It advised, however, that other trade restrictions due to war conditions be lifted.

Thrift is urgently recommended. Governments and municipalities are called upon not to appropriate money not vitally coming in. Reduction of floating debts is demanded, and it is declared there should be no borrowings for other than productive enterprises.
