Commission Will Consider Semi-Monthly Payments to End Loan Shark Evil

PRICE POORLY IMPRESSED

Semimonthly instead of monthly paydays for employes of the Fairmount Park Commission may be established to sid in saving the employes from the elutches of 'loan sharks' who charge letches of 'loan sharks' who charge is 'shaving notes.'

The question of paydays will be discussed at the meeting of the commission next Wednesday. In the opinion of several members of the commission, however, the semimonthly pay system would not wholly obviate the loan cvil. Commenting on the question, Eli Kirk Price, a member of the commission, said today:

"The whole thing has been a matter and it

"The whole thing has been a matter of common knowledge for years, and it has been under consideration at various times. The semimonthly payment basis would not, many commissioners think, would not, many commissioners think, remedy the situation. Certain persons are bound to be improvident and run into debt, and the only thing the semimonthly payment would do would be to have these persons visiting the scalpers twice as often for advances on their

The only real question is the amount of the pay, which, of course, does not always suit the recipient. As a matter of fact the period of delay is not so large as it has been stated. The workers receive their pay at regular thirty-day intervals and usually not more than or five days after the first of the four or live days after the first of the menth. If some one can suggest a real remedy for the situation the commis-sioners would be only too glad to act upon it, but I hardly think that the semimonthly payment scheme would do

Most of the other city employes are paid twice each month. In City Hall etreles it is pointed out that the dis-count evil is not general among these

workers.




