"Quite true," was the soft answer, "but what reason is there for any one to smoke any cigarettes?"

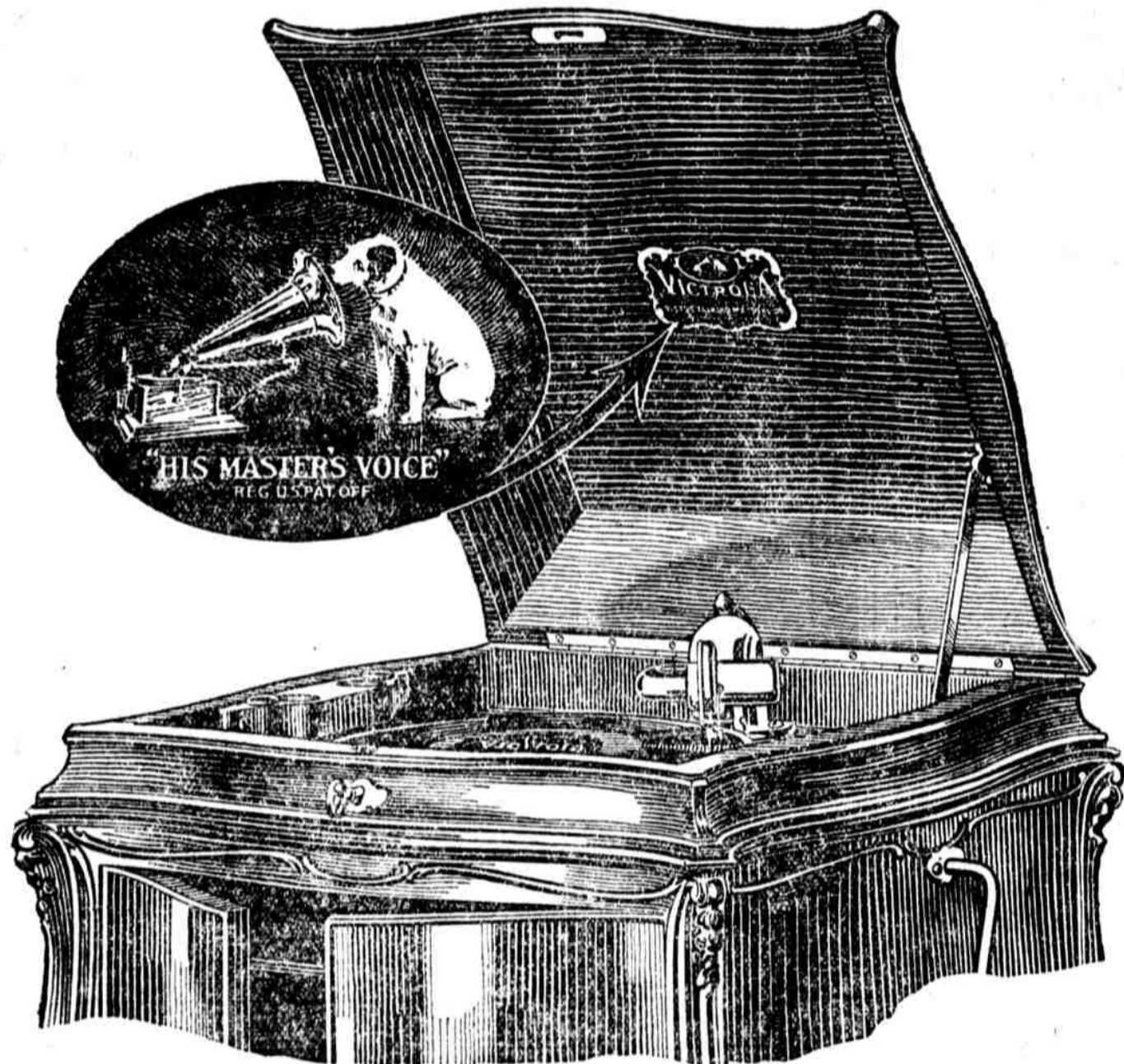
So also, what reason for ginger ale, cigars, gum, neckties, jewelry or a multitude of things we are so unreasonably but so convincingly taught by advertising to want.

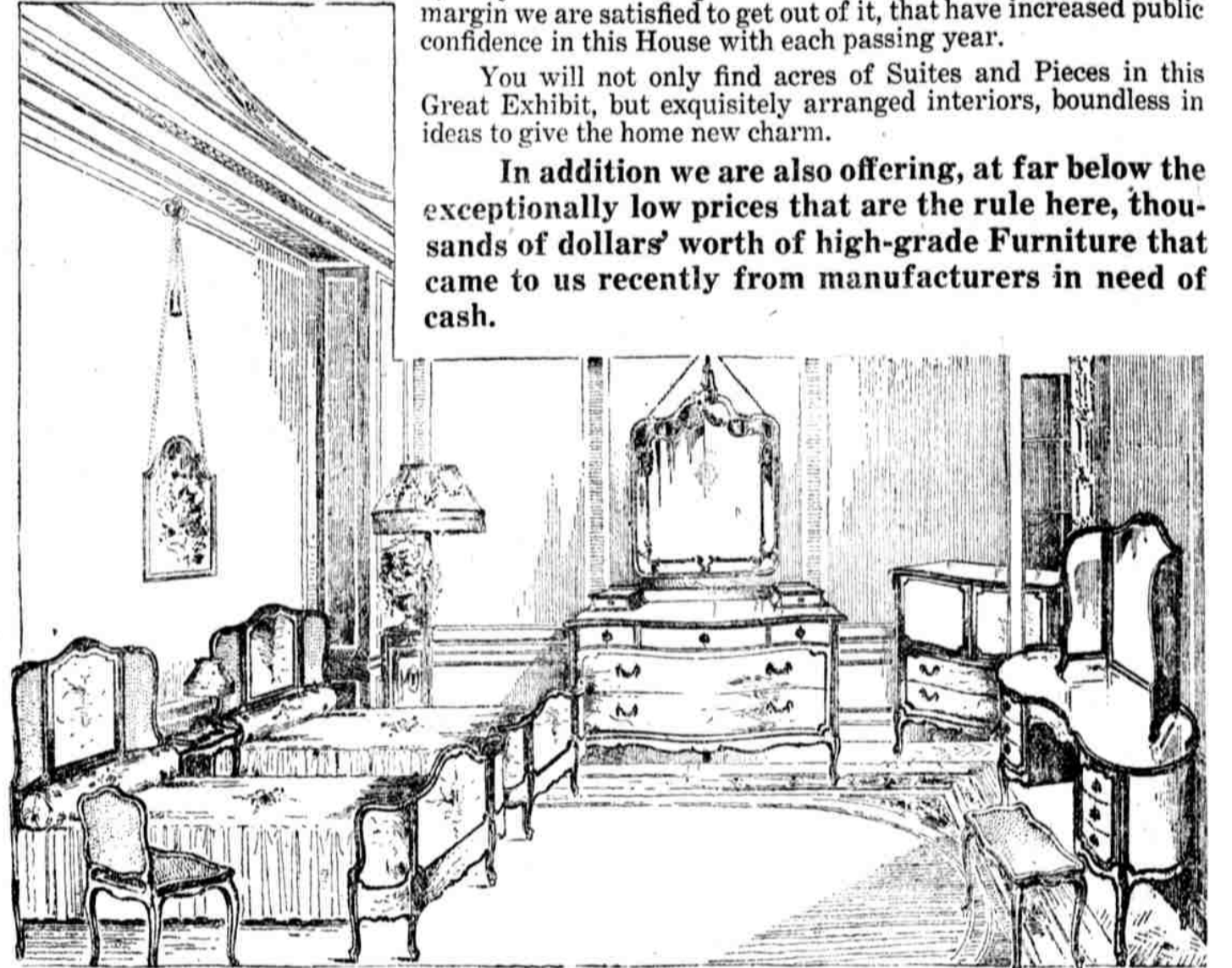
