

ARCHDEACON STUCK DIES IN FORT YUKON

Episcopal Clergy Here Mourn Loss of Devoted Friend of Alaska Indians

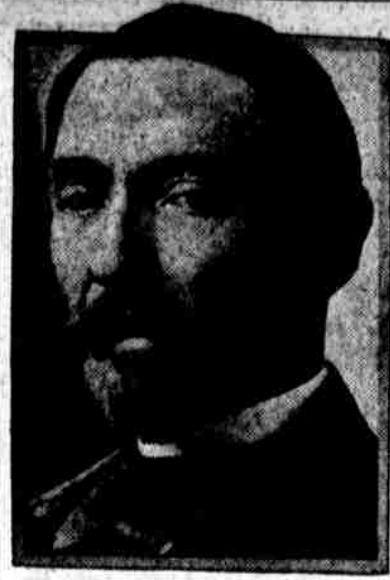
ONCE SAVED STEFANSON

Archdeacon Hudson Stuck, one of the dramatic figures of Alaska, died in Fort Yukon last Sunday. Dr. John Wood, executive secretary of the department of missions of the Episcopal Church, received word by telegram yesterday.

According to the Rev. Phillips E. Osgood, of the Chapel of the Mediator, Dr. Stuck, who was fifty-seven years old, was worn out by his exertions and hardships, old before his time. He was unmarried. He devoted his life to the welfare of the Alaskan Indians.

Archdeacon Stuck was said by his friends to have been of a highly nervous temperament. His nervous energy carried him far, it is said, when more sedate men would have been balked by the obstacles encountered. The Indians idolized him.

One of the achievements of the archdeacon was the relief of William Stefanon, in 1918. At that time Dr. Stuck made the trip to reach the explorer by dog sled and led him back to civilization. Dr. Stuck was born in

England, coming to the United States in 1885. In 1892 he was graduated from the department of theology, University of the South, and in 1904 was made archdeacon of the Yukon while serving as dean of St. Matthew's Cathedral, at Dallas.

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HEALING BY FAITH TO BEGIN TONIGHT

Rev. H. St. John Hathaway Will Lay Hands on Sufferers at Mission

200 PERSONS SEEK HELP

The Rev. H. St. Clair Hathaway tonight will begin the "laying on of hands" at his mission for healing by faith in St. John's Episcopal Church, Germantown avenue and Seymour streets.

More than 200 men and women, sick in mind or body, have appealed to the Rev. Mr. Hathaway, signing cards and setting forth the nature of their illness. Five hundred persons attended Father Hathaway's meeting last night in which he explained his method of healing by faith. He said that faith must be absolute and unflinching if any good is to be accomplished.

can heal the afflicted now as well as in the biblical days," explained the minister. "The reason it may seem unusual is that we have drifted away from God. We have lost the habit of looking to God for relief and must return to the old belief that 'if ye have faith ye can move mountains.'"

According to Father Hathaway, disease is similar to sin, and God did not intend there should be one more than the other, so that "as He has the power to wash away and forgive the sins, so can He soothe and heal the ailments and diseases of the body," but it is necessary at all times to have complete faith in His works.

Father Hathaway's methods are similar to those of James Moore Hickson, the layman healer of the Church of England, who visited Philadelphia a year ago.
