ARCHDEACON STUCK DIES IN FORT YUKON

Episcopal Clergy Here Mourn Loss of Devoted Friend of Alaska Indians

ONCE SAVED STEFANSSON

Andreacon Hudson Stuck, one of the dramatic figures of Alaska, died in Fort Taken last Sunday. Dr. John Wood, executive secretary of the department of missions of the Episcopal Church, receired word by telegram yesterday.

According to the Rev. Phillips E. Osgood, of the Chapel of the Mediator, Dr. Suck, who was fifty-seven years old,

In 1892 he was graduated from the department of theology, University of the South, and in 1904 was made archdeacon of the Yukon while serving as dean of St. Matthew's Cathedral, at Dallas. hardships, old before his time. He argued that these canneries would eateh all the salmon at the annual runs, the Indians farther up the river would eateh none, and thus their winter's feed supply would be wired out and ther would perish. The bill lost.

As supervisor of all the Episcopal missions along the Yukon, Archdeacon Stokowski, opens today with students and faculty assisting in the drive.

This he did in winter by means of dog sleds. One of his widely read books, "Ten Thousand Miles With a Dog Sled," dealt with this part of his work. He wrote "The Ascent of Denali-Mount McKinley," following his accomplishment of that feat with two of his Indians. The proceeds of his books and lectures he devoted to his missionary work.

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


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Rev. H. St. John Hathaway Will Lay Hands on Sufferers at Mission
