



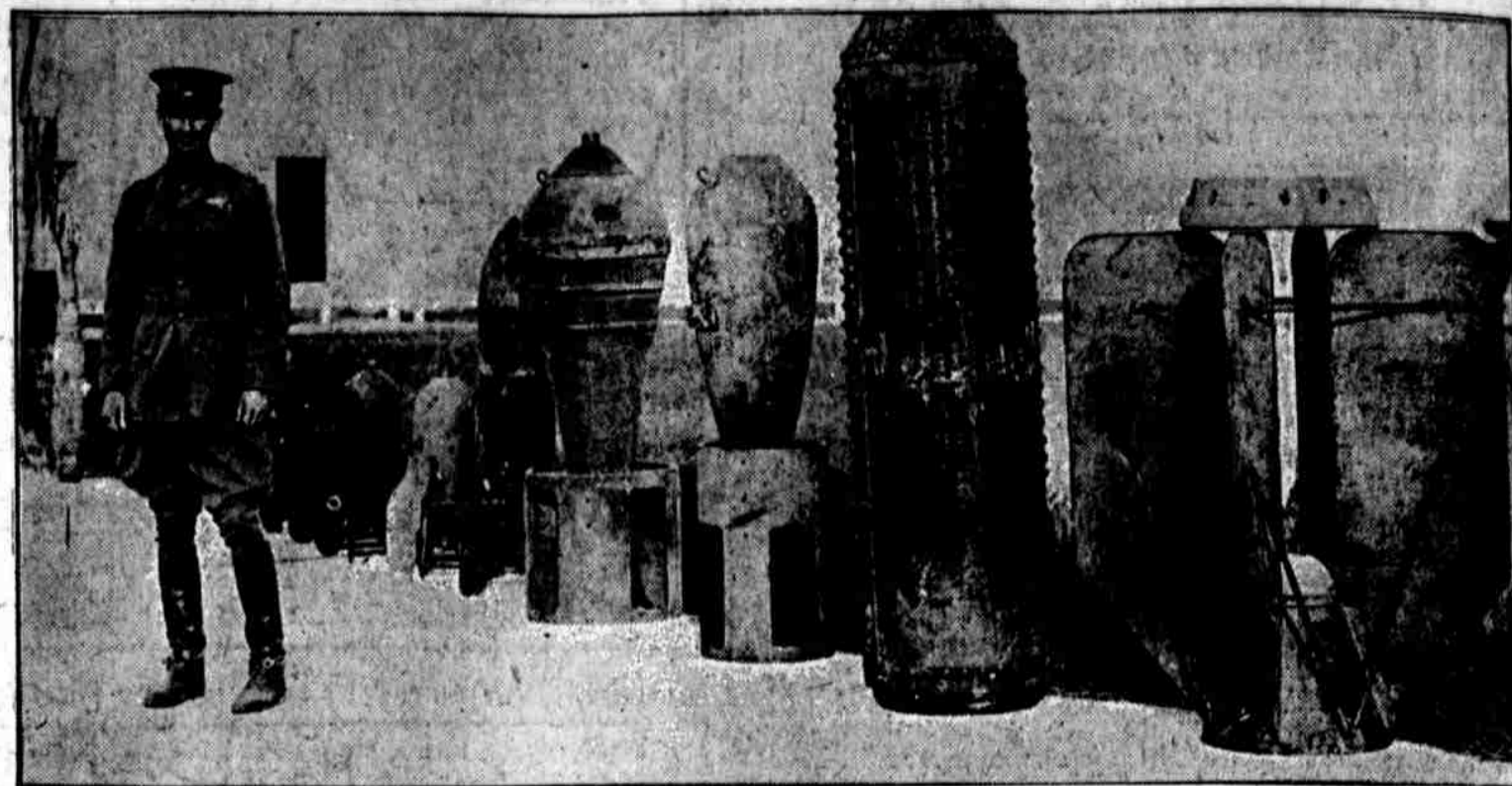

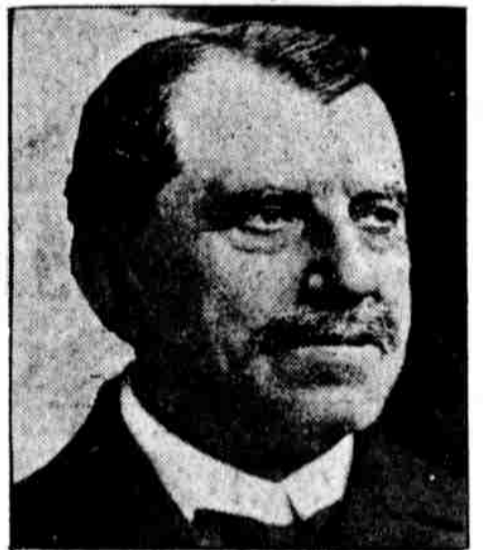

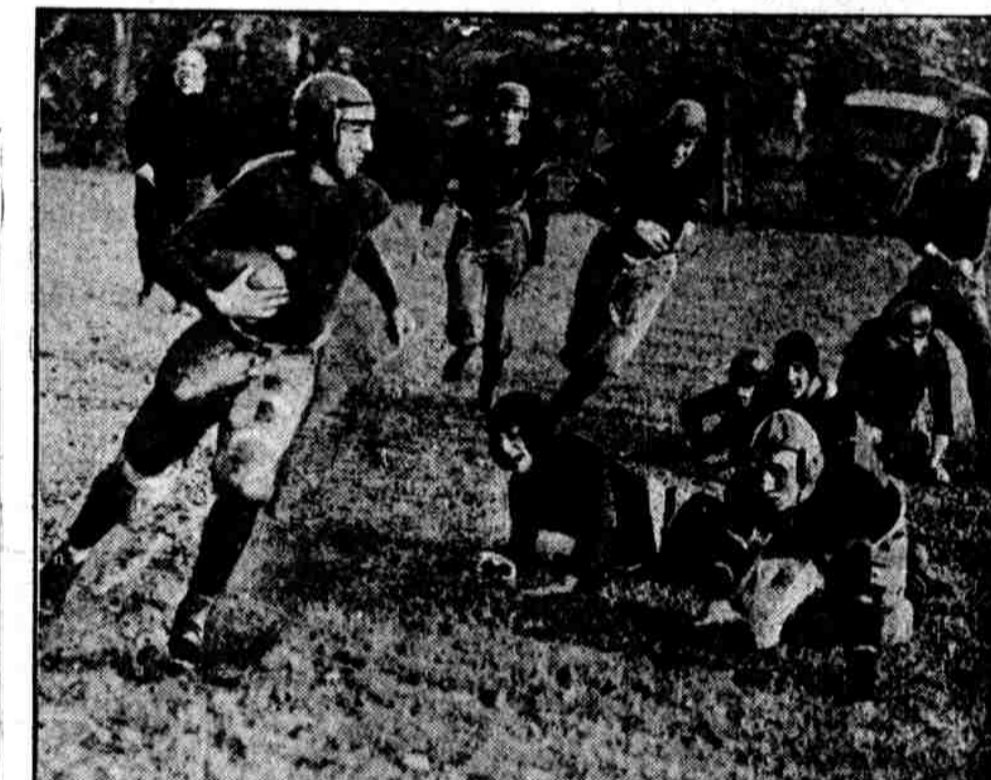

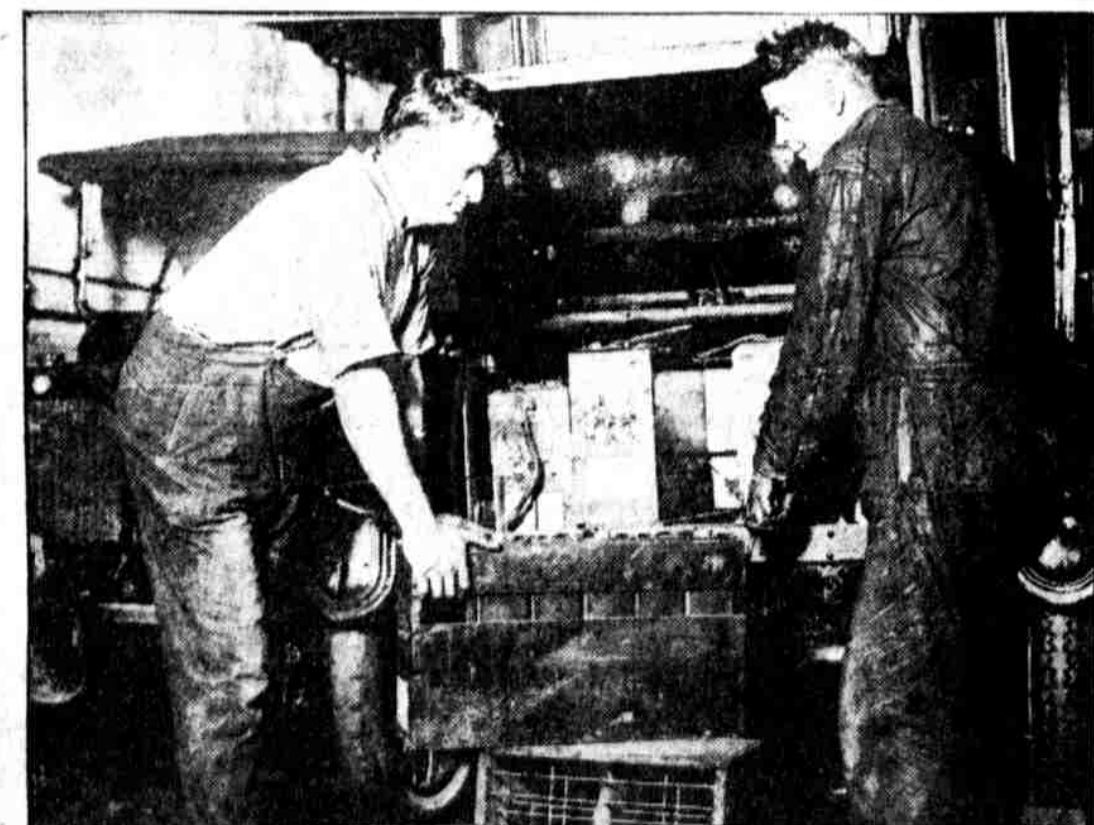


KILLED BY LOVER. Dr. Ruth Rubin, the New York dentist, who was murdered by a jilted suitor.
