With those casual words Captain Wallace Stryker, EVENING PUBLIC LEDGER flying reporter, and Walter Crail, the flying photographer, today dismissed their experiences on Saturday in "covering" from the air the two biggest news events of the day.

Within a little more than three hours the aerial news gatherers had visited Elkton, Md., where a suspect in the murder of Elmer C. Drewes, the Dartmouth student, was about to be taken to Philadelphia for attempted identification, and had electrified the spectators inside the huge "bowl" at Princeton, where the Princeton-Navy football game was being played.

Half Hour to Elkton

Convincing proof of the superiority of news-gathering by airplane was furnews-gathering by airplane was furnished by the flight to Elkton and return. The EVENING PUBLIC LEDGER plane was back, and a photograph of the suspect was in the EVENING PUBLIC LEDGER office nearly an hour before Detective Dickerson arrived with his man at City Hall.

Captain Stryker and the staff photographer packed a big day's work into few hours. They left the flying field at Seventy-first street and Island road at 11 o'clock, and half an hour later were at Elkton. Passengers in a Bal-timore and Washington express train were thrilled by Captain Stryker's "stunts" as he flew low to get his bearings in the fog and mist.




