Evers, who is now in Cuba with to New York Giants, broke into the major leagues as a second baseman for Chicago in 1905. He later went to Boston, then to the Phillies and last season was with the New York Nationals.

Evers was born in Troy, N. Y., in 1883. He began his professional career with the Troy team in 1902. Evers is five feet two inches tall. He throws right handed and bats left-handed.

While with the Cubs from 1905 until 1913 the team won four pennants and two world's championships. Evers was dismissed as the Cubs' manager in 1913 and this action by Charles W. Murphy, then president of the club, resulted in the latter's retirement from baseball. Evers was George Stallings' right-band man in 1914 when the Braves won the pennant and also defeated the Athletics in the world's series in four straight games. That year Evers was paid \$20,000 to sign a contract with Boston.

New York, Oct. 28 .- The minor leagues will refuse to become a party to the reorganization of baseball under the proposed Lasker plan, unless some radical changes are made in the scheme, it was learned today

Minor league officials, who have been investigating the Lasker plan for the appointment of a new National Com-mission, claim the system provides for government without representation and restoration of the draft which the minors have been fighting for years. Several conferences have been held in various parts of the country and it has been informally decided to oppose the to the minor leagues at their annual meeting at Kansas City next month. It is claimed that under the Lasker system the minor leagues, which control more players and territory and have recommonly invested in baseball than majors, are literally without voice in the proposed government of the game, regardless of their apparent right of representation on the commission.




