

BIOGRAPHIES SHOW WHO NOMINEES ARE

Short Sketches About Men Who Are Candidates for State Representative

FORMER COUNCILMEN UP

Philadelphia will elect forty-one members to the Pennsylvania House of Representatives tomorrow. The city is divided into twenty-six representative districts, in all of which nominees will be voted for.

In a majority of the districts the Republican candidates are already members of the State Legislature and are up for re-election. In several instances former councilmen are desirous of representing their old constituents at Harrisburg now that others have been elected to the new City Council. Sketches of the nominees for the lower house are printed herewith:

Philadelphia County

First district—First and Thirty-ninth wards—Two to be elected.

Leopold G. Guss, Republican, born in Russia, 1881; graduated from Shermans High School in 1900; graduated cum laude from University of Pennsylvania college department in 1904; graduated from University of Pennsylvania Law School in 1907; elected to House of Representatives in 1914 and 1916; re-elected in 1918. Recently active on behalf of women arrested within two months of November 2. Lives at 1613 South Sixth street.

Thomas F. McGowan, Republican, lives at 2322 South Tenth street, contractor and fee dealer. Has never held political office.

John J. Donnelly, Democrat, lives at 1608 South Tenth street.

Morris Goldberg, Democrat, 1808 South Eighth street.

Second district—Second ward.

Charles C. A. Bahl, Jr., Republican, born in Maryland, 1890; graduated from Boys' Central High School in 1910; also attended the University of Pennsylvania; served as member of Common Council for two terms; elected to House of Representatives in 1916; re-elected in November, 1918. Lives at 1341 Ellsworth street.

Frank Malone, Democrat, lives at 739 Carpenter street.

Third district—Third, Fourth and Fifth wards.

Arnold M. Blumberg, Republican, lives at 405 South Fifth street. Has never held political office. Is a practicing lawyer.

Henry J. Trainer, Republican, lives at 758 South Tenth street. A liquor dealer nearly all his life. Former Democratic city committeeman from Third ward.

Louis Biehn, Democrat, lives at 610 South Sixth street. Dealer in hot-water heaters.

Alexander A. Oriole, Democrat, lives at 755 South Ninth street.

Fourth district—Sixth, Eighth, Ninth wards.

James V. Lafferty, Republican, 809 Spruce street. Former member of state Legislature, having been elected to the House of Representatives in 1914 and 1918; re-elected in 1918.

Harry A. McDermott, Democrat, 230 North Fifth street.

Fifth district—Twenty-sixth, Thirty-sixth, Forty-eighth wards.

Daniel J. Green, Republican, 1231 South Thirty-third street.

John M. Love, Republican, 2338 South Twentieth street, in the business of plumbing. Has never held political office.

Isaac L. S. Smith, Republican, 2220 South Twenty-third street, ran independent for Council in the First district at last November election.

Walter E. Duffy, Democrat, 2113 Ritter street.

James B. Dugan, Democrat, 1733 Mantion street.

Edward J. Ratlean, Democrat, 1523 South Twenty-seventh street.

Sixth district—Seventh ward.

Andrew F. Stevens, Republican, 1345 Lombard street, in the banking business at Broad and Lombard.

Edward Higgins, Democrat.

Seventh district—Thirtieth ward.

John C. Asbury, Republican, 1710 Christian street, lawyer, former assistant city solicitor. Graduate of University of Pennsylvania Law School.

John Carey, Democrat, 1407 Bainbridge street.

Eighth district—Tenth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth wards.

Timothy J. McCarthy, Republican, 1001 Fairmount avenue, former councilman.

Jefferson W. Smith, Republican, 706 Green street.

Joseph Bailey, Democrat, 1017 Cherry street.

Stephen E. Ursprung, Democrat, 1116 Mount Vernon street, has been in the stationery business at Twelfth street and Ridge avenue for last four years; born in Philadelphia forty-six years ago; has never held political office.

Fifteenth district—Twenty-second and Forty-second wards.

Franklin Spencer Edmonds, Republican, 133 South Twelfth street, lawyer, teacher; former Progressive party leader; has been active in many fields. He was head of soldiers' leave department and of legal department, Y. M. C. A. E. 1918-19.

Edward Smith, Republican, 1129 East Chelton avenue.

Joseph L. McAloer, Democrat, 304 West Upsal street; is a practicing lawyer.

Hugh F. Quinn, Democrat, 4907 North Eleventh street; is in the real estate business at 1916 Columbia avenue.

Sixteenth district—Twenty-third, Thirty-fifth, Forty-first wards.

James A. Dunn, Republican, 5131 Minor street, born in this city 1864; at the age of thirteen was employed by the William S. Cramp Shipbuilding Co.; foreman of the Filter Cordage Co. for twenty-nine years; president of the Republican executive committee of the Twenty-third ward for six years; elected to the House of Representatives in 1912, 1914, 1916, 1918.

Nelson Webster, Democrat, 5801 Cottage street.

Seventeenth district—Twenty-fourth, Thirty-fourth, Forty-fourth wards.

Theodore Campbell, Republican, 2101 North Sixty-third street, born in Salem County, N. J.; became an apprentice in drug business in 1886 and was graduated from Philadelphia College of Pharmacy in 1892, since which time he has been engaged in the drug business; elected to the House of Representatives in 1908, 1914, 1916 and 1918.

James J. Heffernan, Republican, 324

Richard D. Burns, Republican, 752 North Nineteenth street, is in the business of plumber; born in Philadelphia forty-three years ago; represented Fifteenth ward in old Council in 1918 and 1919.

Christopher Hare, Democrat, 1931 Buttonwood street.

James M. Kelly, 640 North Twenty-third street.

Eighteenth district—Seventeenth and Eighteenth wards.

Frank H. Stackhouse, Republican, 1118 East Columbia avenue, timkeeper at Cramp's Shipyard; defeated Richard Curry, present member of House of Representatives, for nomination.

Edwin N. Manning, Democrat, 1843 Cedar street, is in the roofing business; never held political office; born in Eighteenth ward.

Nineteenth district—Nineteenth ward.

Henry Keene, Republican, 144 West Cumberland street; born in Philadelphia in 1864; saloonkeeper; member of old Council for last ten years of its existence.

Lawrence F. McOwen, Republican, 2529 North Eighth street; is a practicing lawyer.

John Flanagan, Democrat, 1913 North Hope street.

Robert Riley, Democrat, 2244 North Mütter street, a painter by trade; never held political office.

Twentieth district—Sixteenth and

Twenty-first wards.

Joseph Marcus, Republican, 1445 North Eighth street, is present assistant clerk of City Council; has never held an elective office; graduate of Girard College.

Clinton O. Sowers, Republican, was born in Philadelphia, 1879; educated in the public schools; admitted to the bar in 1900; served three years in Common Council; elected to the House of Representatives in November, 1918.

Christopher Hoellin, Democrat, 1860 North Tenth street.

John J. Lague, Democrat, 1530 North Sixth street.

Fourteenth district—Twenty-first ward.

Wallace Bromley, Republican, 126 Sunac street; is a practicing lawyer.

James Pagan, Democrat, 115 Salig-nac street.

Fifteenth district—Twenty-second and Forty-second wards.

Samuel J. Ferry, Republican, 3014 Salmon street, born in Delaware City, Del., 1890; learned trade of boiler-making and worked at Cramp's Shipyard; clerk in office of receiver of taxes; member of the House of Representatives since 1908.

John F. Snowden, Republican, 3393 Amber street, born in Philadelphia, 1856; after being in grocery business for a number of years, went into manufacture of wooden ware, which he discontinued during the war and since has been employed at Cramp's shipyard; member of the House of Representatives in 1914 and 1918.

James T. Rogan, Democrat, 2807 Aramingo avenue.

James J. Rooney, Democrat, 1807 East Russell street.

Nineteenth district—Twenty-eighth, Thirty-seventh wards.

Edward Haws, Republican, 1240 Hazard street, was a member of the old Council from the Thirty-seventh ward.

Jeremiah J. Miller, Republican, 2328 North Natrona street.

James H. Gleason, Democrat, 2738 North Seventh street; an insurance investigator.

Charles Grear, Democrat, 2238 North Twenty-eighth street.

Twentieth district—Twenty-ninth, Forty-seventh wards.

Patrick Comer, Republican and Democrat, 2807 Oxford street, born at West Grove, Chester county, 1870; became well known at sixteen for the late Senator Thomas B. Harper, and is now manager of that concern; member

of the House of Representatives in 1911, 1913, 1915, 1917, 1918.

John H. Drimhouse, Republican, 2022 Oxford street, has been a member of the House of Representatives since 1914, prior to which he was deputy collector in the United States Internal Revenue Department, and clerk in the office of receiver of taxes.

W. F. O'Brien, Democrat, 2432 Master street.

A. K. Kasior, Democrat.

Twenty-first district—Twenty-seventh, Fortieth, Forty-sixth wards.

James Franklin, Republican, 6725 Thomas avenue, was sergeant-at-arms of the State Senate, session of 1889, and of the Philadelphia Select Council from 1903 to 1907; is now in real estate business; elected to the House of Representatives in 1889 to fill unexpired term and re-elected in 1890; resigning in 1891; elected to the House of Representatives in 1917; re-elected in 1918.

James A. Walker, Republican, 5913 Baltimore avenue; graduated from University of Pennsylvania in 1900 and admitted to the bar; is secretary of the Commission to Codify and Revise Laws of the Commonwealth relating to banks, private bankers and trust com-

panies; elected to House of Representatives in 1916 and re-elected in 1918.

Edward J. Hassett, Democrat, 132 South Sixty-second street.

John Kearney, Democrat, 1251 South Fiftieth street.

Twenty-second district—Thirty-second ward.

Benjamin Golder, Republican, 2011 North Thirty-third street; has been a member of the House of Representatives since 1916; lawyer in the office of John C. Bell; captain during the war with overseas service.

Charles J. Thomson, Jr., Democrat, 2017 North Fifteenth street; has never held political office; in insurance business for past twenty-four years; born in Philadelphia.

Twenty-third district—Thirty-eighth ward.

Albert S. C. Millar, Republican, 2818 North Twenty-sixth street; is a practicing lawyer; born 1894 in Philadelphia; studied law in office of Louis Breitinger and now his law partner; member of old Council.

Michael F. Fitzpatrick, Democrat, 3010 North Twenty-first street; clerk in recorder of deeds office; was defeated for Republican nomination at

primary and is now on Democratic ticket.

Twenty-fourth district—Thirty-third ward.

Thaddeus S. Krause, Republican, 635 East Allegheny avenue, is a present member of the House of Representatives; graduate of Ursinus College and University of Pennsylvania Law School; practicing lawyer.

Oliver G. Casey, Democrat, 2723 North Mascher street; an electrolyte finisher; born in New York city forty-two years ago; has received labor indorsement.

Twenty-fifth district—Forty-third ward.

Thomas Blunt, Republican, 728 West Erie avenue, is a lawyer. He formerly served in the old City Council.

William Naylor, Democrat, 3234 North Sixth street.

Twenty-sixth district—Thirty-first ward.

Philip Sterling, Republican, 2042 East York street, has been member of the House of Representatives since 1916; graduate of Central High School, University of Pennsylvania Law School, and is a practicing lawyer.

Edward F. McPeak, Democrat, 2024 Frankford avenue.
