

WILL SELECT NEW LEADERS IN LEGION

Present County Committee to Cease to Function Due to New Constitution

WOMEN TO HOLD DANCE

There will be a complete change of leadership in the American Legion in Philadelphia county following the dissolving of the present county committee which takes place tomorrow night. The county committee has been in existence for approximately seventeen months. It automatically ceases to function as a result of the adoption of the new constitution which provides for the organization of a new county com-

mittee or the appointment of a district deputy to supervise Legion affairs in this city. While it is not assured that the requisite three-fifths of the posts in the county will request the department commander, David J. Davis, to organize a county committee in accordance with the new constitution, H. Eugene Heine, chairman of a special committee composed of the delegates on the constitutional committee at the Allentown convention, declares confidently that the requisite number of posts will have acted favorably on this matter within a short time. Unless three-fifths of the seventy-six posts in the county call for the organization of a county committee, the posts here will be under the direction of a district deputy appointed by Commander Davis. The county committee, on the other hand, if it is organized, will consist of about 150 members which will represent the posts on the basis of one member from each post and an additional representative for each 100 paid-up legionaries. Three names have been added to the committee which is organizing the reception to Commander Davis at the City Club November 17: Vincent A. Carroll, commander of Maneto Post, No. 270; William H. Creamer, Jr., commander of Joseph Faussett Bellink Post, No. 195, and Andrew F. Olsen, of the All-Navy Post, No. 197. Yeoman (F) Post, No. 50, is making elaborate plans for its annual ball at the Bellevue-Stratford Tuesday evening, November 16. The committee is actively at work, in charge of Miss M. B. McCormick. The post hopes that the attendance on this occasion will be such that it will be one of the largest Legion events of the year.

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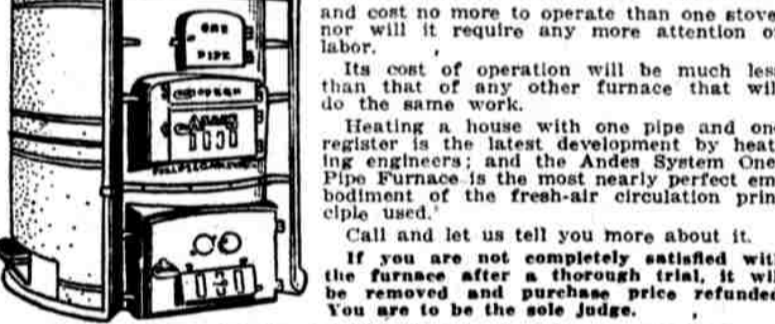
