Boise, Idaho, Nov. 5.—With 185 voting precincts and an estimated 15,000 voters yet to be recorded in Idaho, Republicans majorities straight through the state and national tickets, except in the senatorial race, continued in the ratio of two to one over the Democratic candidates.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. Mex., Nov. 5.—

Virtually all counties from all sections of the state show Senator Harding carried New Mexico by a majority of at least 6000 votes, Nestor Montoya, of Albuquerque, Republican candidate for Congress, was elected over Antonio Lucero, of Las Vegas, by a majority of about 4000.

REPUBLICAN VOTE IN MISSOURI GROWS

St. Louis, Nov. 5.—Returns from sparsely settled outlying districts in Missouri, which only in recent years became even "doubtful" in its Democratic tendencies, yesterday served to increase pluralities for nearly every Republican candidate.

Only three counties had not been heard from last night, and political observers said there was little chance they would change the status of any candidate.

In the election to the House with five precincts normally Democratic missing in the Fifth district, Bland (D.) led Ellis (R.) by 250 votes.

Senator Harding led with a plurality of more than 120,000, but Senator Spencer, running against Breckenridge Long for the Senate, fell behind his ticket, although his plurality was expected to be nearly 100,000.

Thirteen Republicans and two Democrats were elected representatives, a gain of eight for the former.

One apparent Democratic victory was turned into defeat when an error of 2000 votes in the First Congressional district gave the election as representative to Millsbaugh, Republican, when Romjue, Democrat, apparently had been re-elected.

Following closely on the defeat of Champ Clark, Democratic standby in the Ninth district, it became apparent that Captain Milligan had lost in the Third. Milligan was elected to succeed Representative Alexander when Alexander became a member of President

ERNST NOW LEADING IN KENTUCKY RACE

Louisville, Nov. 5.—Richard J. Ernst, Republican candidate for United States senator, went into the lead yesterday and with but two-one precincts out of the entire state missing, he had a majority of 7768 over Senator J. C. W. Beckham, Democrat.

The vote from 3205 precincts out of 3238 in the state gave Ernst, Republican, 462,049; Beckham, Democrat, 454,281.

Governor Cox, however, was still the leader in the state and with but eighteen precincts missing in the state had 461,263 votes, against 457,841 for Senator Harding.

The result of the voting in one precinct in Kentucky probably will not be known. A fight ensued at the polls and the ballot box was stolen, according to a telephone report here. This was in Breathitt county, in the heart of the mountain district.

TENN. REPUBLICANS GET 5 CONGRESSMEN

Memphis, Tenn., Nov. 5.—(By A. P.)—With Tennessee definitely in the Republican electoral column, returns gathered by newspapers indicated today that the Republicans had captured five of the state's ten seats in the lower house of Congress. Two members of Tennessee's present congressional delegation are Republicans.

Incomplete tabulation of the vote in the Eighth district gives Lon A. Scott, Republican, a slight lead over Gordon Browning, Democrat.

The election in the Third district of Joseph Brown, Republican, over John A. Moon, Democrat, incumbent, has been conceded by the Democrats, while in the First and Second districts Republicans were elected. Both districts at present are represented in Congress by Republicans. Tax Problems That the New Administration Must Face

Of vital concern to every one of us, because indissolubly linked with the high cost of living, is the problem of tax revision that confronts the new Administration at Washington. "There is no question that Federal taxation is a burning issue the country over," declares the Philadelphia Public Ledger (Ind. Rep.), which adds that "if the country is to be saved from the inequalities of the present taxation, which is both sectional and too arbitrary in its class distinctions, it must be through the combined common sense of both parties, and not through any doctrinaire adherence to partisan systems."

During the fiscal year 1920 Federal taxes amounted to \$5,408,075,468, an increase of a billion and a half over 1919. And since the cost of running the Government next year will be at least \$4,000,000,000, according to the estimates of Secretary of the Treasury Houston, the problem for the present is to devise a better, not a smaller, tax.
