

MAN SHOTS WIFE AND COMPANION

New York Resident Finds Couple Here After Search for Year

ARGUE BEFORE SHOOTING

Mrs. Bittori Buccola, twenty-two years old, and Rosario Paresse, twenty-seven years old, were shot in a rooming house at 1022 Passyunk avenue, late last night.

The shooting, the police say, was done by Bittori Buccola, of New York, as a result of the alleged intimacy of his wife and the injured man.

Mrs. Buccola is in the Pennsylvania Hospital with a wound in the head. Paresse is in the same hospital suffering from a wound in the neck. Both are expected to recover. Buccola escaped.

Mrs. Buccola left her husband in New York more than a year ago. Since that time, he said while arguing with her last night, he has carried on a search for her, and recently learned she was in this city.

Yesterday, he told her, he came to Philadelphia and located her living at the Passyunk avenue address. When he saw the two together he accosted them and began to argue with his wife.

Mrs. Buccola told her husband she had no desire to return to him and said she was satisfied to live as she had been living, the police say.

This so enraged the husband that he drew a revolver from his pocket and began shooting at the couple. The first shot missed, but he continued shooting until both fell, and then fled.

Other roomers in the house pursued the husband, but he soon outdistanced them. He is believed to have returned to his home in New York. The injured man and woman were taken to the hospital in the patrol of the Seventh and Carpenter streets station.

Theodore C. Hook Leaves for New York Business Conference and Vanishes

WIFE FEARS FOUL PLAY

Theodore C. Hook, of 5438 Catharine street, a former captain of ordnance, disappeared October 27 and has not since been seen.

He left his home that day to take the noon train for New York, where he had arranged a conference with officials of the National Glue and Jelly Co., Fifty-ninth street and Eleventh avenue. He did not reach the offices of the company.

Mrs. Hook has appealed to the police for aid in searching for her husband. She fears he may have become the victim of bandits. She is in a serious nervous condition following his disappearance. Five weeks ago she was released from the Misericordia Hospital, where she had passed a month following a serious operation.

The missing man is thirty-eight years old, and is a thirty-second degree Mason. He is a Knight Templar and member of Lu Lu Temple, Mystic Shrine.

Unable to go into line service at the beginning of the war, he entered the ordnance bureau and received the rank of captain. He was stationed in Detroit as an army inspector in the Studebaker automobile factory. For meritorious work in speeding up army production he received mention from Congress.

Following his discharge from the service, on April 5, 1919, Captain Hook became mechanical engineer in the paper box factory of G. A. Bisher, 245 North Sixth street. After resigning that position, he began negotiations with the firm in New York, where he was bound when he left his home last week.

The Hooks have been married twelve years.

LEGION HAS MAN ARRESTED

Wolf Charged With Collecting Money for Fake Funerals

Elmer Wolf, twenty-one years old, of G and Clearfield streets, was held in \$1000 bail for further hearing by Magistrate Wrigley today on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. The Harry L. Greenwood Post, of the American Legion, which caused his arrest, accused Wolf of being the man who has been posing as a war veteran to obtain money from Legion posts.

Hugh L. Ross, of 3153 Aramingo street, testified at the hearing that he had given \$20 to Wolf recently when the latter posed as a representative of the government, and offered to take charge of the funeral services of Ross's brother, Sergeant James M. Ross, Company K, 315th Infantry, killed overseas, whose body was recently brought home.

Wolf, it is alleged, came last night to a meeting of the Greenwood Post at Frankford avenue and Somerset street, where he asked the members to attend the funeral services of a Julius Siefert, 1837 East Monmouth street, another war victim, whose body has just been brought home.

The members of the commission left here for Camden, where they will start to inspect Route 8, which is the section of the new state highway running through Cumberland county. It goes from Camden to Bridgeton and Salem by way of Woodbury, Mullica Hill, Woodstown and Polo Tavern.
