

CAMDEN SCHOOLS MAY GET MILLION

Big Sum Will Be Used to Improve Facilities if Estimates Receive Approval

TO DECIDE ON REVENUE

More than \$1,000,000 will be spent in Camden to improve public school facilities, if the estimates on new buildings and equipment received by the Board of Education at a special meeting this morning, are approved.

Methods of raising revenue to meet these requirements, as well as action on the submitted estimates, will follow at regular conferences of the board and the Board of School Estimates later this month.

For the Rosedale School, \$150,000 is required for building extensions and improvements. Improvements and equipment for the North Orange Hill School involve an outlay of \$200,000. For improvements to the Bessie School, on Mt. Ephraim avenue, \$150,000 is needed. Other contemplated expenditures are: Yorkship Village School, \$140,000, for improvements; Whitler School, \$100,000, for improvements; mechanical department new high school, \$60,000; for betterments to other buildings and equipment, an aggregate of at least \$100,000 more.

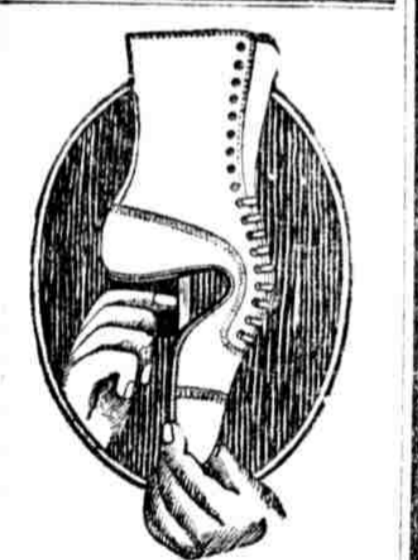
This estimate calls for a total outlay of \$1,030,000 for the advancement and enlargement of the public school system of Camden, to meet all demands for school space, necessitated by growth of the community, and to give every opportunity to place all student children who are now on "part time" in the schools for full-day sessions.

Formal action on the submission of today will be taken by the Board of Education at a regular meeting later, and the estimates will then be voted upon and passed upon by the Board of School Estimates. Methods of raising the additional revenue will also be determined—whether tax revenues are sufficient or whether a bond issue will be necessary.

HARDING LEAD OVER COX 22,867 VOTES IN CAMDEN

County Board of Election Makes Official Statement of Ballots Cast
In the official canvass of last Tuesday's election the Camden county board of elections yesterday showed that Harding had a plurality over Cox of 22,867. The total vote for Harding was 40,987 and 18,120 for Cox. Debs, the Socialist candidate, received 2478 votes and Watkins, Prohibitionist, 724.

F. F. Patterson, Jr., congressional candidate, received 21,808 plurality for the long term and 21,491 for the short term. Dr. Jennie Sharr, Prohibition candidate, received 1096 votes. She had a platform favoring a curfew law for children, and women as censors for movies.

Joseph Wallworth, Republican, had a plurality of 23,058 over Samuel H. Shap, Democratic candidate for state senator. The Republican Assembly candidates received pluralities as follows: J. Huggins Cole, 22,730; William T. Gibbs, 22,158; and T. Harry Rowland, 22,140. Isaiah Hatch, elected sheriff on the Republican ticket, had a plurality of 22,290 over Victor King, Democrat. William D. Brown, county clerk elect, won by a plurality of 23,146. Joshua C. Haines, for register of deeds, by 22,931, and Chester A. Bardsley, for coroner, by 23,205.

The soldiers' bonus went through by a vote of 42,593, and the bridge bond issue was carried by 45,465 to 2147.

Anderson, real estate deputy; and Alfred M. Matthews, office deputy. Chester A. Bardsley is the new coroner.

The new sheriff of Gloucester county is Selah Clark, of Pittman Grove, who is accompanied to the county seat at Woodbury by some of his town folks. He announced the appointment of G. Harold Leap, of Swedesboro, as deputy sheriff; Harry J. Major, jail warden, and Mrs. Major, matron. Dr.

SMELLING SALTS NO HELP

Woman Tries in Vain to Save Asphyxiated Neighbor

That Smelling Salts are Insufficient to Restore a Person Overcome by Gas is a Fact Demonstrated by Laura Shipper, fifty years old, of 637 North Teuth street, who was found yesterday morning overcome by gas, but who was not sent to a hospital until last night.

About 11:30 o'clock the woman was found unconscious sitting in a chair in a second story room, while gas was flowing from a small stove near her. Another woman, who lodges in the same house, the police say, tried to restore her by the use of smelling salts, and was still working with perseverance about 7:30 o'clock last night, when Mr. Simpson, the proprietor of the lodging house, returned from work.

"This is a case for a hospital," he exclaimed in consternation, and summoned Detective Titus, who had the woman sent to the Hasbemann Hospital. A pulmotor was used, but she was still in a serious condition at a late hour last night.

INDICT 'CRANK' ON 4 COUNTS

He is Accused of Murder, Burglary, Kidnaping and Extortion

Augusto Pasquale, "The Crank," was indicted by the grand jury at Norristown yesterday on charges of murder, kidnaping, burglary and extortion, in connection with the disappearance of Blakely Coughlin. The Coughlin baby was stolen from its crib at the home of Mr. and Mrs. George H. Coughlin, near Norristown, early on the morning of June 2.

It was 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon when the grand jury of twenty-four men from all sections of Montgomery county made the presentment in the presence of "The Crank" and the district attorney, before President Judge Aaron Schwartz. The judge remanded the prisoner back to jail for trial. District Attorney Reaninger would not say last night whether Pasquale would be tried this week. The trial may be postponed, there being several other murder trials on this week's criminal list.
