GREAT INTERFERENCE BY DARTMOUTH MEN

Big Green Eleven Shows Pennsylvania How Football Really Should Be Played—Shelburne Wonderful Offensive Man

WHEN the Dartmouth team trounced Pennsylvania 44 to 7 in Franklin Field Saturday they administered the worst defeat that a Green eleven has ever had the honor of beating a Red and Blue aggregation. Back in 1914 Dartmouth handed Pennsylvania a 41-0 defeat, but even that was not quite as bad as Saturday's tilt. But don't blame Coach Heineman nor the Red and Blue players. They did all they could and then some. Many of the Pennsylvania players were hurt and some of them so badly that they may not have been able to play at all.

On the offense Pennsylvania was outclassed. In the first period the Red and Blue didn't even make one first down. It was hopeless and miserable showing for an eleven representing a university which boasts of nearly 12,000 students. Started Too Late. One thing that Pennsylvania did, or rather didn't do, was to start their general attack too late. In the first period they didn't score, although the ball was in Pennsylvania's territory most of the time. If they had started their lofty operation in the second period, the game might have been differently. Not that Pennsylvania would have won; they were too far outclassed to win even by a fluke, but they might have had a better chance.
