

LEGION MEN HERE TO HELP WOUNDED

County Committee Will Consider Care for War Victims in City Hospitals

TWO POSTS ALREADY ACT

On suggestion of National Commander Colonel Fred W. Galbraith, Jr., at the Davis reception, the Philadelphia county committee of the American Legion, at its final meeting Monday evening, November 23, will consider methods of caring for disabled veterans in hospitals here.

Two posts have already taken such steps. Benjamin Franklin Post has authorized a committee to visit comrades and provide for entertainments in hospitals. This committee, as announced by the post commander, consists of Theodore Le Boutillier, Dr. Fairfax Irwin, the Rev. Dr. Edwin M. Jeffries, Joseph A. Lamorelle and R. F. Johnston.

The post will invite a number of disabled veterans from the hospitals in Philadelphia to its entertainments as guests. It will also arrange for visits at the hospitals.

Walter M. Gearty Post is also interesting itself in this work. It has a larger percentage of wounded men than any post in the city.

One of the results of the speech of National Commander Galbraith will be that there will be organized here a movement to place a Christmas tree in every hospital where wounded men are.

Charles J. O'Neill, of Post 335, has relinquished his position as post commander to enter vocational training.

Post 315 tendered a reception last night to David J. Davis, department commander, which was also a reunion of the 100th Infantry and veterans of the Civil and Spanish-American Wars. It was held in the First Infantry Armory.
