

BOOZE SOLD FAST AS SHIP IS RAIDED

Bottles of Smuggled Whisky Are Found in Coal Bags and Bakeovens

SOME EVEN ON FISH LINES

New York, Nov. 19.—Lightning-fast sales of whisky on the decks of a steamship from Havana while federal officers were raiding the hold of the vessel created extreme nervousness in the "bootleg" market on Wednesday and prices reached a new low level for the post-prohibition period.

That became known when forty-seven sacks filled with bottles of various liquors were delivered at the office of the port surveyor. Federal agents asserted the liquidation of liquors by sailors and dockworkers on deck was frantic in its swiftness and some bottles sold as low as half a dollar on the gamble that the transaction could be completed before the prohibition agents emerged from the companionways.

Agents searching the ship found liquor hidden in nearly every available spot. Cases were brought up from the depths of water tanks; fishlines, hauled out of the water, disclosed bottles where the hooks should have been; coal bunkers yielded bags filled with bottles, and from the baker's oven, instead of loaves, there were brought forth bottles. Others were found in the crew's nest and in the ice boxes. Eight quart bottles were found beneath the lining shirt of a negro baggage man, while his trousers' pockets yielded two more.

Pittsburgh, Nov. 19.—W. Wayne Hindman, prohibition director for the western district of Pennsylvania, has tendered his resignation to John F. Kranner, commissioner, to become effective December 1. Arthur McKean has been named his successor, it is reported.

Mr. Hindman's action was taken suddenly. He was appointed director when the Volstead act became effective. Pittsburgh has been considered a hot-bed of bootleggers.

Uniontown, Pa., Nov. 19.—Thirty hotelmen and barkeepers, of Uniontown, were arrested and charged with violating the prohibition laws. They were held in jail of \$1000 each. Warrants for the arrests were sworn out by a "committee of one hundred," which is composed of professional and business men and private citizens of Fayette county. Twenty more warrants will be served tomorrow, authorities announced served today.

But—this is important—never stir the rice. Boil twenty minutes. Then pour water off, if any, and place in open oven where it will finish swelling without burning. Each grain will stand alone, plump, tender, and delicious. Consult any standard cook book for a number of excellent recipes for rice.
