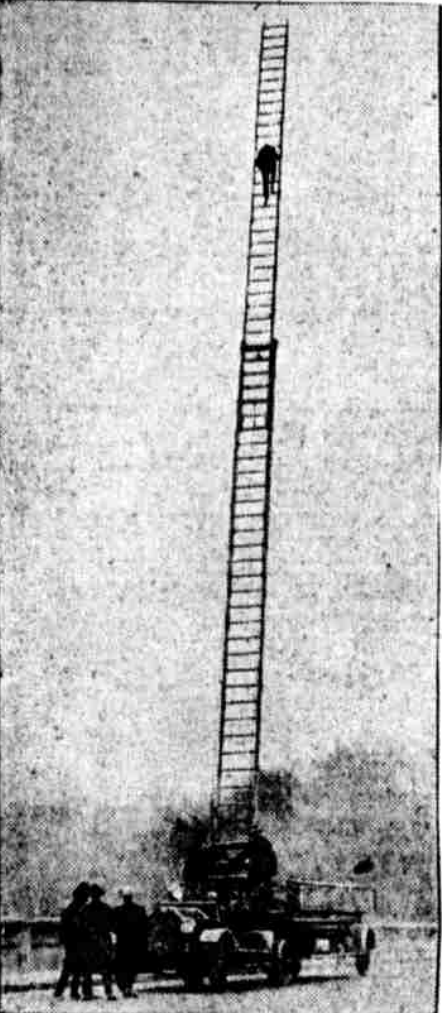
LITTLE BO-PEEP. Elsie Thatcher, with this beautiful costume, takes a part derived from well-known verse.



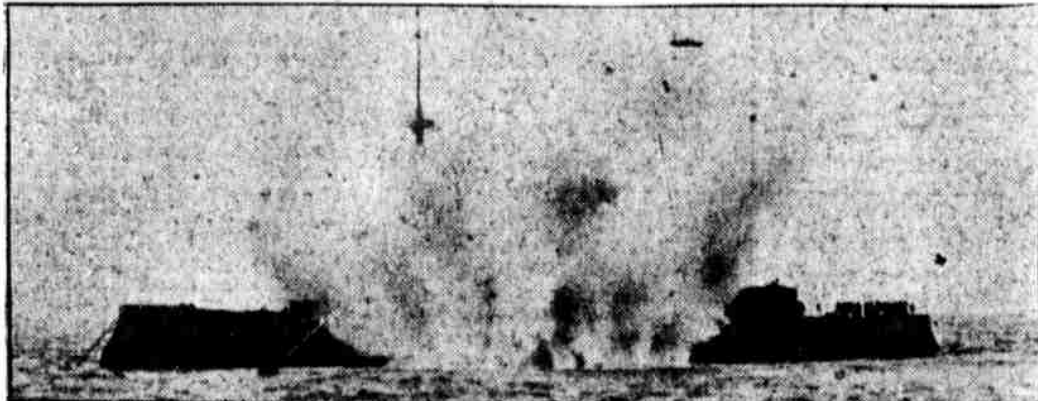

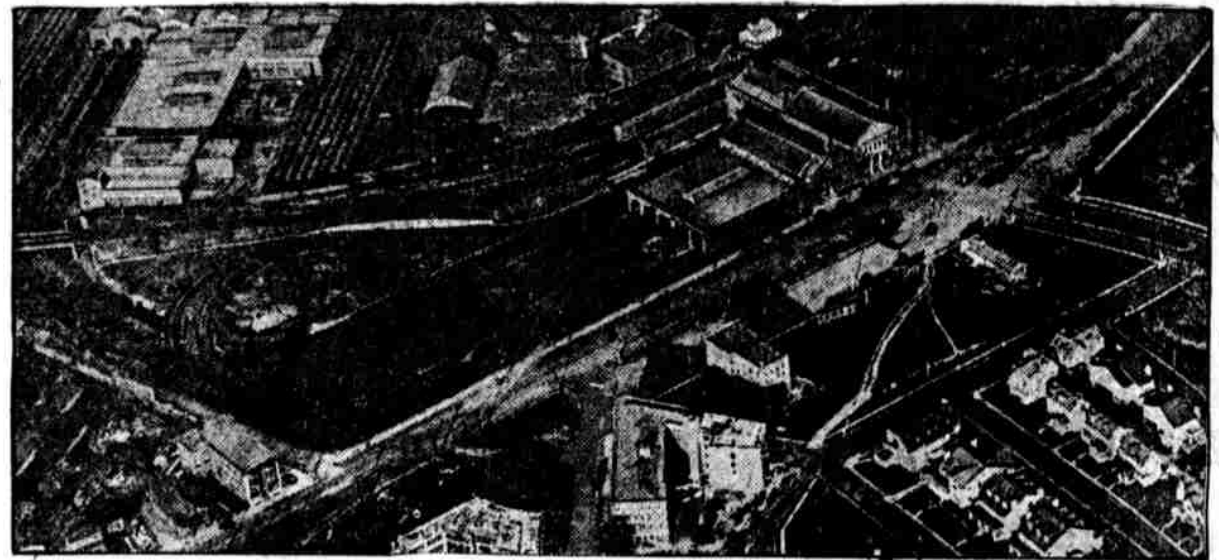

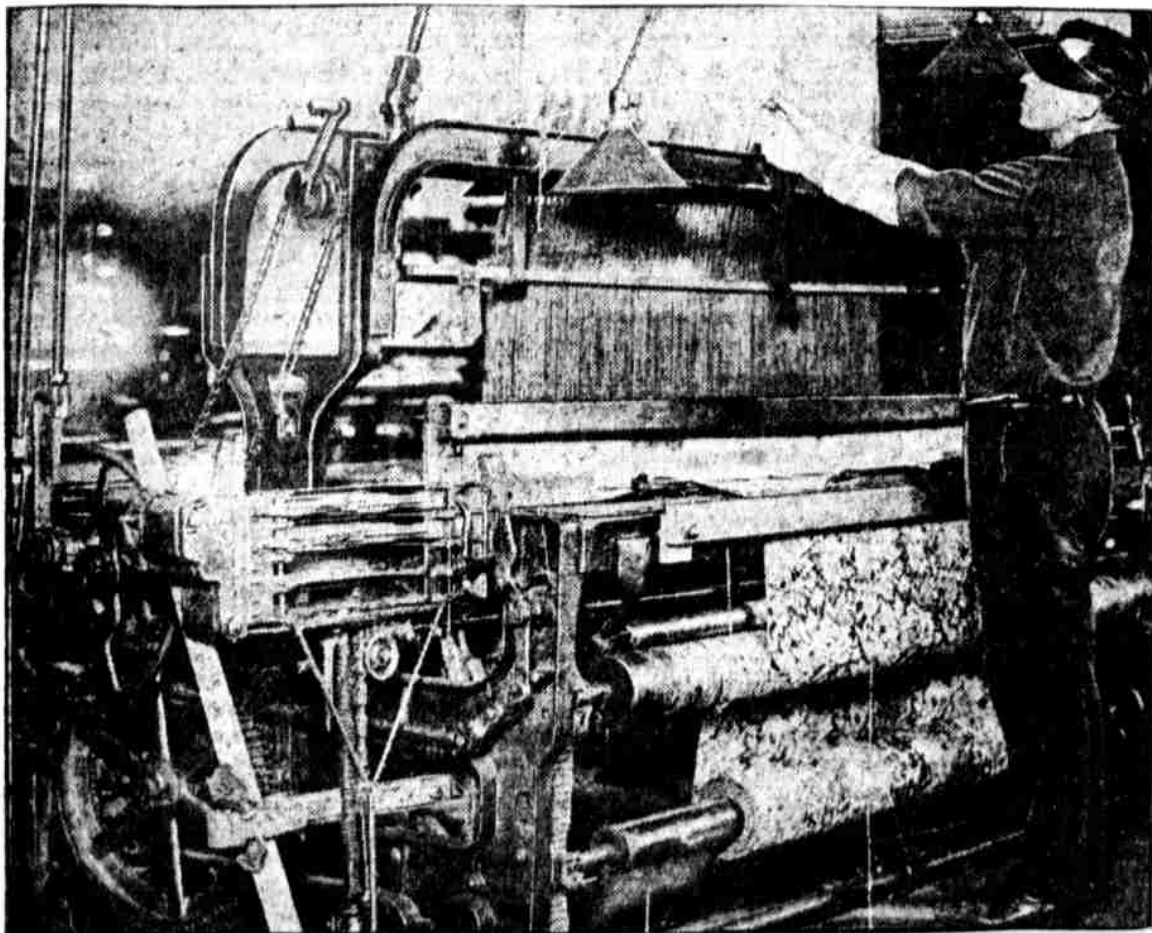


NEW STYLE IN AUTOPEDES. Parisians are enjoying this vehicle, which is a great improvement on the ones where the rider had to stand.
