EVERY year about this time the same bowl is emitted by the football fans in protest to the abrupt ending of the season. Ten weeks seems to be a short time, as interest increases instead of lagging at the end. Folks have formed a habit of spending Saturday afternoon in the open and make the outings in December.

Today the college ends and outside of the Army-Navy tussle on Saturday and a few post-season battles, the molehills will be put in a nap for next year.

However, the game of football will be played here in Philadelphia in December and weekly games will be staged in the Phil's ball park, according to present plans. Leo Conway has become interested in the game and will make an effort to entertain the gridiron followers every Saturday afternoon until about November 27, an independent football game will be played between the Philadelphia and Frankfort teams. Philadelphia defeated Holmesburg last week. The game was so successful and the large crowd was so pleased with the playing that this contest was arranged. Following this, an effort will be made to bring down the Shenandoah team, champion of the coal regions, and Jim Thorpe's great Canton eleven.

Independent football can be just as good as the college game, because here the players are old college stars. For example, take the Philadelphia line-up: Heinie Miller, Lou Wray, Lou Little, of Penn; Bodie Weldon, of Lafayette; Swede Youngstrom, of Dartmouth; Anderson, of Colgate; Spangna, of Lohigh, and Coffey, of Notre Dame, will be in the game. Coffey made a big hit last Saturday with his punting, drop-kicking and open field running.

Tamaqua, Coaldale, Shenandoah, Pottsville, Shamokin and Mt. Carmel, and thousands attend the games. This means the sport is conducted properly and the players know the rules.

Therefore, the independents are coming to their own, especially now that the college season has ended. The college stars, benefiting by their previous experience, put up a brainier game than the collegians and seldom is a mistake made. On Saturday several All-American stars will perform and show whether or not they still are as good as of yore. We think they are.

A six-hour program is scheduled for the Olympia, while cards of five bouts each are to be put on respectively at the National, Cambria and Auditorium.

Low Tandler and Willie Jackson, two of the best and hardest punching lightweights in the world, will box—but in different bouts and at different clubs. Tandler will encounter Johnny Tillman, well known to local fans and who is a waterweight, in the feature frays of eight rounds at the National. Jackson will pair off with another hefty fighter in Matt Brock, of Cleveland, at the Olympia.

Scoutmaster to the Tandler-Tillman set at the National will be a local boy of interest between Joe Timm and Jimmy Murphy, both West Philadelphia. The entire National program is:

## YALE THANKFUL NEXT SEASON IS YEAR AWAY

### But O'Hearn, Freshman Quarter, Is Ray of Light in Shadows—Believe Youngster Will Be Great—Est Eli Has Ever Known

The Harvard defense was much stronger than Yale's.

The breaks will rarely favor a team such as Yale's because Yale has no attack to help force the breaks, to give them a chance to develop.

But with two machines as well matched as Princeton and Harvard as well as Yale, the shift in luck may have the break of the game or the turn of luck might easily decide the issue when Pitt and Penn State hook up with forces that look to be about equal.

HARVARD hasn't lost a football game for two years and Princeton alone has been able to tie it.

In the last three years Harvard has lost only two or three games—not very many.

The Crimson record has been extremely brilliant.

But there is nothing brilliant about Harvard's stand in regard to numbering, or not numbering, her football players.

The Harvard coaches admit there is a distinct advantage on the part of a scout in following numbered teams.

As we understand it the basic principle of sport is "a fair field and no favor."

With her opponents now all numbered, Harvard is taking what she admits is "distinct advantage."

There can, therefore, be very little credit for any victory gained in any such way.

The Harvard Crim has made its name in the college ranks of the student body and the bulk of the graduates are lined up for the reform. If the Harvard coaching staff doesn't fall in line the football rules committee will either force it upon them or their incompetency in handling an important feature of the modern game.

No one coaching staff is big enough or powerful enough to maintain an admitted advantage that isn't earned upon the field.

Central High will lose six of the regulars and quite a few dependable substitutes as a result of the February and June graduations. Davitt, Wells, McAlpin, Clarke and Jansson are the only members of the High School League championship team and will again be the leaders for that position and the choice of all-scholastic by the unanimous vote of the critics. The Northwest Boys' Club scored second place for the team prize, with Meadowbrook third and Germantown Boys' Club fourth.

The race was started by Sam Dallas at Thirtieth and Filbert streets, this morning, and was run over the following course: out Parkway to Washington monument, to a point near Lenox Hill, to Logan Square, to Washington monument, and ended at Thirtieth and Filbert.

There were forty-five entrants for the fifteen medals—five gold medals to the first five, silver medals to the next five, and bronze for the next five. There were three team prizes. Crawford had a handicap of two minutes and ten seconds.
