

3 PERSONS KILLED BY CARS AND TRUCK

Woman Crushed to Death by Trolley Car—Machine Runs Over Boy

POLICE HUNT FOR DRIVER

A woman and two boys died as the result of traffic accidents in the city last night.

A thirteen-year-old boy was instantly killed when run over by a heavy motor-truck. A seven-year-old boy lost his life in his hurry to reach a "movie" show, when he ran in front of a trolley car. Crossing an uptown street, a woman stepped in front of a trolley car, was crushed, and died in the hospital an hour later.

The dead are:

Nicholas Ruskin, seven years old, 822 North Hancock street.

Elizabeth Adolph, six years old, 8035 North Fourth street.

William Hensley, thirteen years old, 1812 Medary avenue.

"Nick" Ruskin hurried from his parents' home shortly after 7 o'clock. Near Second and Poplar streets he ran across the street toward the entrance of a brilliantly-lighted movie-picture place. The boy failed to notice the approach of a trolley, and the motorman could not halt his car in time. The boy's feet were crushed. He was rushed to the Roosevelt Hospital, where surgeons operated, but he was weakened by loss of blood from the crushed feet and legs, and died on the operating table.

Elizabeth Adolph crossed Fifth street at Luzerne, at 10 o'clock last night, and failed to see a Fifth street trolley car. She was struck and hurled under the wheels. At the Samaritan Hospital the woman did not regain consciousness, dying a short time after admission.

Police are trying to trace the driver of a heavy motor-truck who put on power and left thirteen-year-old "Billie" Hensley dying in the streets, after the wheels of the machine had passed over the boy's body.

The accident occurred at Chelton avenue and Limekiln pike. Young Hensley, and a companion, Thomas Town, of

1451 Sparks street, Branchtown were on their way home just before dark, and as the motor-truck neared them, they asked for "a lift." The driver is said to have assented.

Both boys ran and grabbed the side of the truck, intending to jump on the running board. Hensley slipped, lost his balance and fell directly between the front and rear wheels of the truck. The rear wheels passed over his body and Hensley was dead when carried into the Jewish Hospital.

Police say the truck driver, instead of helping remove the injured boy to the hospital, put on power and got away. Descriptions of man and machine have been sent out by police of the Germantown station.

Miss Ada Fisher, seventeen years old, 78 Avenue F, was run down by a motor-truck this morning as she alighted from a westbound Market street car at Thirty-second street. She was severely bruised, and after being taken to the University Hospital was sent home.

Benjamin Malised, twenty-six years old, of 520 Douglas street, driver of the truck, was held under \$500 bail by Magistrate Harris, in the Thirty-second street and Woodland avenue station, for a further hearing next week.

DANIEL J. McNICHOL, CONTRACTOR, DIES

Brother of Late Senator James P. McNichol Had Been Ill for Several Months

POPULAR IN TENTH WARD

Daniel J. McNichol, brother of the late Senator James P. McNichol and a widely known contractor, died last night at his home, 2022 Race street. He had been ill for several months.

Mr. McNichol was fifty-four years old and a former member of the McNichol Paving and Construction Co. He was the directing genius of the firm, which built many Philadelphia enterprises, including the Market street subway-elevated line, the filtration plant at Torresdale and the Northeast Boulevard.

On account of ill health Mr. McNichol was compelled to retire from active connection with the firm about three years ago.

In a quiet way Mr. McNichol did much to relieve the suffering of the poor in the Tenth ward, and while he associated in politics somewhat, he never sought political office or honors.

Mr. McNichol was graduated from the Northwest Grammar School and

immediately took an active interest in the contracting business of his father. His father was engaged in the contracting business for more than fifty years. In 1901 Mr. McNichol married Miss C. M. Taylor. His widow and a daughter Katherine survive him.

A genial disposition and a sincere interest in the welfare of others gained Mr. McNichol much popularity. Many organizations were named in his honor, among these were the Daniel J. McNichol basketball and football team. He

always took a great interest in athletics and did much to inspire the five sons of the late Senator McNichol, who have gained much fame in basketball, baseball and other sports. Arrangements for the funeral have not yet been made.

Twenty-seven Pass as Pharmacists
