Tokyo, Dec. 8.—By A. P.—A party of 170 Japanese who recently arrived here from the United States today denied newspaper reports that they had left America because of ill-treatment and anti-Japanese feeling there.

Representative members of the party declared Japanese never suffered because of racial prejudice and were fairly treated. They said they made money during the war and could afford to leave in order to go to their motherland.

United States the telegraph systems are government owned and in many countries radio communication is a government monopoly. It has been the custom of this different government to communicate in session held in Washington, D.
