DISRAELI'S AUDACITY

EQUAL TO JEFFERSON'S

The Purchase of the Suez Canal Shares Required the Same Kind of Courage as the Purchase of Louisiana

Lord Redesdale, in his delightful memoirs, remarked that the early volubility of the ex-Prime Minister Benjamin Disraeli, by W. F. Montpenier, were dull and uninteresting, but that George Earl Buckle, who took up the story of Disraeli's life, was much more successful in revealing the man to his readers. The last two volumes, which have recently appeared, cover the period from 1858 to the death of Disraeli in 1881. It was during these years that Disraeli became an international figure and achieved his greatest triumphs.

CONSTANTINE

Paxton Hibben Tries to Set the Deposed Greek King Right Before the World

Paxton Hibben, who was a newspaper correspondent in Greece during that part of the war when Constantine still held the throne, has written a book about the deposed king which will make most interesting reading now that the Greek people have voted in favor of his return.

Mr. Hibben was convinced that the censorship on Greek news prevented the world from reaching the outside world. When Constantine was deposed he returned to America, but he waited until the war was over before he offered his version of what had happened in Greece during the critical period. His book is an attempt to vindicate Constantine from the charges of pro-Germanism. He insists that the king was always in favor of joining the Greek army to the army of the Allies and that only the refusal of the Allies to guarantee the integrity of the Greek state prevented union from the beginning.

PRESS-AGENTING IN THE SOUTH SEAS

Two More Books That Make the Region Attractive to Irresponsible Youth

The amount of press-agenting which the South Seas have had within the last two years or so must rank the leading topic of the South Seas series. Some of the most Maughlian turned popular attention to the Tahiti by his "The Moon and Sixpence," in which the experiences of an artist in that desolate island were described. The discovery that the original of the artist was Gauguin, an artistic French painter, was followed by the translation into English of his book about the island and his life spent there in his own experience.
