BASEBALL MEN GATHER TO FORM AGREEMENT

Judge Landis Presides at Session Which Will Completely Reorganize "the National Game"

New York, Dec. 11.—Committees from the major and minor leagues, with Judge Landis in the chair, convened here today on scheduled time to draw up a new national agreement to govern professional baseball.

It was announced that the conference would be adjourned before noon and the migrants and guards before night, entrance to the chamber with instructions to prevent entrance of newspapermen.

At the same hour representatives of the National Association of Minor Leagues will enter to draw up a new national agreement.

Besides the great task of formulating and enacting a new constitution which it is hoped will satisfy all parties in the agreement, a number of other important matters are expected to be disposed of, including some important details involving exchange of major league players, many of which have been rumored recently.

Trade Rights for Bureau

The rights that led up to the success of adopting a new national agreement had their beginning about two years ago, when the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues, the organization of minor leagues, broke away from the national agreement relative to the transfer of instruction to prevent entrance of newspapermen.

Then there arose from various quarters a demand for a reorganization of the national commission, generally referred to as the court of baseball. The commission had been composed of the presidents of the National and American Leagues with August Herman, president of the Cincinnati club of the National League, as chairman.

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ROWLAND COLUMBUS BOSS

Ex-White Sox Manager Gets New American Association Birth Columbus, O., Dec. 11.—Clarence Rowland, former manager of the Chicago White Sox and of the Milwaukee American Association team, has been named manager of the Columbus Club of the American Association, it was officially announced today.
