

# DR. HOLLIS GODFREY RESIGNS AT DREXEL

### Accepts Chairmanship of Council of Management Education

### HAD NOTABLE RECORD

Dr. Hollis Godfrey, president of Drexel Institute, has been appointed chairman of the council of management education. This announcement was made last night when Dr. Godfrey made public his resignation from Drexel in order that he may devote his time to the national work of the council, the organization devoted to the task of effecting complete cooperation between industry and the 120 colleges of the United States.

# N. J. UTILITY BOARD OUSTER HELD VALID

### Supreme Court Declares Governor Had Power to Remove Commissioners

### SECOND APPEAL EXPECTED

Trenton, Dec. 27.—The action of Governor Edwards recently in ousting the State Board of Public Utility Commissioners from office following charges brought before him by the city of Jersey City, accusing the board of mismanagement in office and neglect of duty in granting increased rates for trolley fares and other utility rates, was upheld today by the Supreme Court. The provision of the act of 1911, under which the board was created, vesting in the governor the power to displace the commissioners after charges had been preferred and a hearing given, was upheld by the court.

It is expected that the ousted commissioners will immediately take an appeal to the Court of Errors and Appeals, the highest state court.

Despite the action of the governor in ousting the commission, it has continued to function, the members questioning the governor's legal right to remove them. When the governor proposed the board be called a special session of the Senate and nominated a new board, Democratic in complexion, to replace the old Republican commission. The Republican Senate, instead of oustering the appointments, referred the matter to Attorney General McCran to determine the legal status of the de facto board. The attorney general requested the attorney general to act in the matter and the latter instituted quo warranto proceedings in the Supreme Court demanding by what right the board continued to usurp the functions of the utilities commission.

# HARDING PLANS TO LOWER TAXES

### President-Elect Drops Foreign Affairs to Devise Means to Cut Expenditures

### TO SEE CONGRESS CHIEFS

Marion, O., Dec. 27.—Turning from the consideration of foreign policies to a discussion of domestic problems, President-elect Harding plans to hold conferences this week with a number of Senate and House leaders. Some time next week he is expected to leave his home here for a trip to Florida, where he will rest and hold conferences until March 4, when he will be inaugurated.

Congressional leaders who have been asked to come here for conferences with Senator Harding this week include Senator McCumber, of North Dakota, and Representatives J. W. Good, of Iowa, Frank Mondell, of Wyoming; Patrick H. Kelly, of Michigan, and Daniel R. Anthony, of Kansas.

Will H. Hays will be in Marion this week for a discussion of cabinet selections, and Senator Harding will confer with Governor-elect Harry L. Davis, of Ohio, regarding Senator Harman's resignation from the Senate and the appointment of a successor to finish out his unexpired term. Days on which the various conferences will be held were not announced.

# MASKED MEN RAID CORK NEWSPAPER

### Entire Plant of Examiner Destroyed With Sledge Hammers and Bombs

### EDITOR IGNORED WARNINGS

Cork, Dec. 27.—Thirty armed and masked raiders invaded the offices of the Cork Examiner Christmas eve, wrecked parts of the building with explosives and set fire to the property. They escaped before the arrival of the police. The fire was extinguished, but other damage was very extensive.

The raiders, who wore civilian clothing, remained twenty-five minutes. It is believed the attack was caused by the attitude of the Examiner on the recent pastoral letter issued by the bishop of Cork.

The military say there is proof that no soldiers or police were concerned and the outrage is attributed to Sinn Fein, hostile to Bishop Cohan, of Cork, and to the Cohanian Devoxy faction in America whose cause the Examiner has been espousing. Warnings to abandon this attitude accompanied by threats had been received by the editor prior to the attack.

The sentence of the general court-martial of Countess Markiewicz on a charge of inciting disaffection is two years at hard labor. The charge was based on her activities in organizing the Fianna, or Irish Boy Scouts. It is expected she will be removed to England to serve her sentence.
