

HIGH SCHOOL GIRLS TO FIGHT CHEATING

Students Organize as Part of Reserves Movement of Y.W.C.A. Member Always "On Honor"

FAVOR SIMPLE DRESSES

A council of Philadelphia high school girls, which is composed of two students from each high school, has been organized as part of the Girls' Reserve Movement of the Young Women's Christian Association of the east central field.

The object of the council is to develop high school students in the four essentials of the movement—health, knowledge, service and spirit. Among the resolutions which are adopted is one that declares "that cheating in examinations is contrary to the Girl Reserve purpose and code and that no girl can continue in good standing as a Girl Reserve and cheat."

Another resolution requires the Girl Reserve, who always "on her honor," to report any infraction to the staff representative of her corps. If she does not do this the corps will take action in the matter. The Girl Reserves are pledged also to support all organizations and activities under the direction of the faculty.

The local high school students also heartily favor the simple form of dress which provides for serge frocks for winter and fall and gingham dresses and middie blouses for spring and summer.

The resolutions further declare that "extreme heels is not a form of simple dressing" and that Girl Reserves do not dance "shoe to shoe" or in any other improper position.

"Conduct in public places," bars loud laughter, loud talking, calling, "horse play" and flirtatious looks. In public places, it is explained, is meant confectory stores, the street, dance halls and libraries.

It is pointed out that inasmuch as the new club rooms of the Germantown Girl Reserve are to be opened tomorrow at 3820 Germantown avenue, that all Girl Reserves' recreation, which includes dancing, should take place in rooms such as these, except on special occasions.

Mae Taintor, Germantown High School, president; Ellen Donovan, Girls' High School, vice president; Helen Wood, Kensington High School, secretary and treasurer.

A meeting of the committee, which includes twenty members a Girl Reserve and a representative at large, will be held on January 8, and plans will be outlined then for the first annual banquet on February 11.

FORT WASHINGTON ARMS

\$2000 Subscribed by Citizens to End Outlawry

As the result of numerous hold-ups at Fort Washington during the past ten days the citizens of that borough have subscribed more than \$2000 which to pay the salaries of policemen and motorcycle officers newly hired. Since the employment of these men to police a district which had hitherto gone unguarded except for the efforts of two constables, not a single theft case has been reported.

Two of the largest townships north of Philadelphia are alien to this city in the motorizing of their police force. In both Cheltenham township and Abington township, where the homes of many wealthy Philadelphians are located, the efficiency of motorized police service has been demonstrated many times recently.

HOLD BOYS AS AUTO THIEVES

Police Say Youths Were Not "Watching Car"

Shortly after an automobile was stolen from the motorcar agency of Richard Weaver, 2517 West Girard avenue, last night, police found the car with two boys in it at Corinthian and Girard avenues.

The boys told Reserve Patrolman Combs that they were merely watching the car. They said two men had asked them if they wanted a ride at Twenty-sixth street and Girard avenue, and they accepted. Neither boy could drive an automobile, police say.

They were William Kennedy, twelve years old, Twenty-eighth street near Poplar, and Charles Botson, eleven years old, West Flora street near Twenty-ninth. They were sent to the House of Detention for a hearing.

RESEARCH BUREAU FOR ALL GAS FACTS

Survey Should Be Thorough, Statement Says, So City May Form Policy

PRESENT DATA MEAGER

All facts bearing on the operation of the municipal gas works since 1907 should be obtained in the gas survey recently authorized by Council, the Bureau of Municipal Research declared today.

"The gas works are leased to the United Gas Improvement Co. The lease expires in 1927. Complete data should be obtained, the bureau stated, so the city can work out a policy for the operation of the gas plant after the present lease terminates."

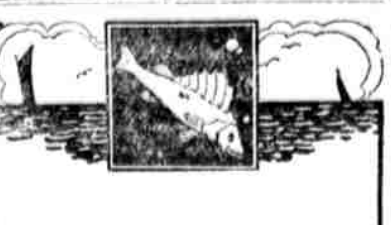
Continuing, the bureau's statement said:

"The information now in the hands of the city is very meager indeed, for the bureau of gas has been operated primarily to test the quality of the gas

but not to secure the fulfillment of all of the terms of the lease, nor to examine the records of expenditures for improvements and extensions. The assembling of the facts must be made with all the cards on the table, and the tone of the company's letters to the Mayor would seem to indicate that the company is willing to co-operate fully in the survey."

"After the facts have been secured regard to past years' operation and the financial condition of the company, the survey board will be in a position to suggest a permanent adjustment to the gas standard and in the price of gas in accordance with a new standard. If a new standard should be required sooner or later, its adoption now would secure for the city the greatest benefit from extensions and improvements to be made during the remaining seven years of the lease, and therefore the maximum equity in gas facilities when the lease expires."
