CITY-WIDE SHIFT OF POLICE HEADS IS PLAN OF MAYOR
Believes Cleaning Up of All Wards Will Break Power of Job Combine

"LAW MUST BE SUPERIOR TO LAWLESS," HE ASSERTS

Allentown, Pa., Dec. 30.—A city-wide shifting of police lieutenants is impending in Philadelphia. This information was disclosed by Mayor Moore in talks today with friends just before leaving for Philadelphia. The Mayor let it be known that the pining of Lieutenant Marple in charge of the station house in the Fifteenth ward, Judge Brown's home ward, was only a prelude to similar changes all over the city. Mr. Moore came here to address the Kiwanis Club last night. In his address he indicated his readiness to declare war on Senator Penrose when he said he would not have Philadelphia controlled by "outside legislative influences." So far as the police are concerned, the Mayor will not stand for the old system by which politicians, gamblers and crooks were able to approach police officials in plain clothes and slip them something in exchange for an official blindness on the part of the police. "The law must be superior to the lawless," said the Mayor.

Expels Many Dealers
More than that, the Mayor believes that this drive against crooks, gamblers, dope fiends and dope purveyors and their alliance with police will do more than anything else to break up the job combine in Philadelphia. The Mayor does not think that the combine, which is in sympathy with so-called "old times" and the "side-open city," can stand out against a determined smash at the ring of vice and politics. The Mayor expects that as a result more and more ward leaders, who now are aligned with the new official city plan, "come out and slip" them something in exchange for an official blindness on the part of the police.

Mayor Says People Stand by Him in Political War
Allentown, Pa., Dec. 30.—Commenting on his speech last night, Mayor Moore said: "I am glad to see the spirit in which the people of the state have received my appeal for support in the fight against the forces of evil. They are in favor of the law and against the lawless."

D'ANNUNZIO WILL LOCKED IN HOME, QUIET FIUME BY AIR

Trieste, Dec. 30.—Hostilities at Fiume between Italian regular troops and D'Annunzio's legionaries end last night. The formal agreement for cessation of hostilities has been signed. Orders for a cessation of fighting at Fiume apparently followed a report to General Cavaglio, commander of Italian regulars in Dalmatia, that the council of Fiume, to which Captain Gabriele D'Annunzio had turned over his powers as head of the "regency of Quarnero," had accepted the terms of the Italian Government.

I offered it hundreds of times smilingly in my war, but it is not worth while to throw it away in the service of a people who could not be distracted even for a moment from their Christian fanaticism, which the world being dominated by their government."
