Apparent and complimentary evidence of the storm which whirled out of the West a few weeks since, in the form of a challenge of war to the hilt for supremacy on the part of the Western Golf Association, has faded away to a form of truce having been declared.

given to followers of the sport in this country by the following cable message.

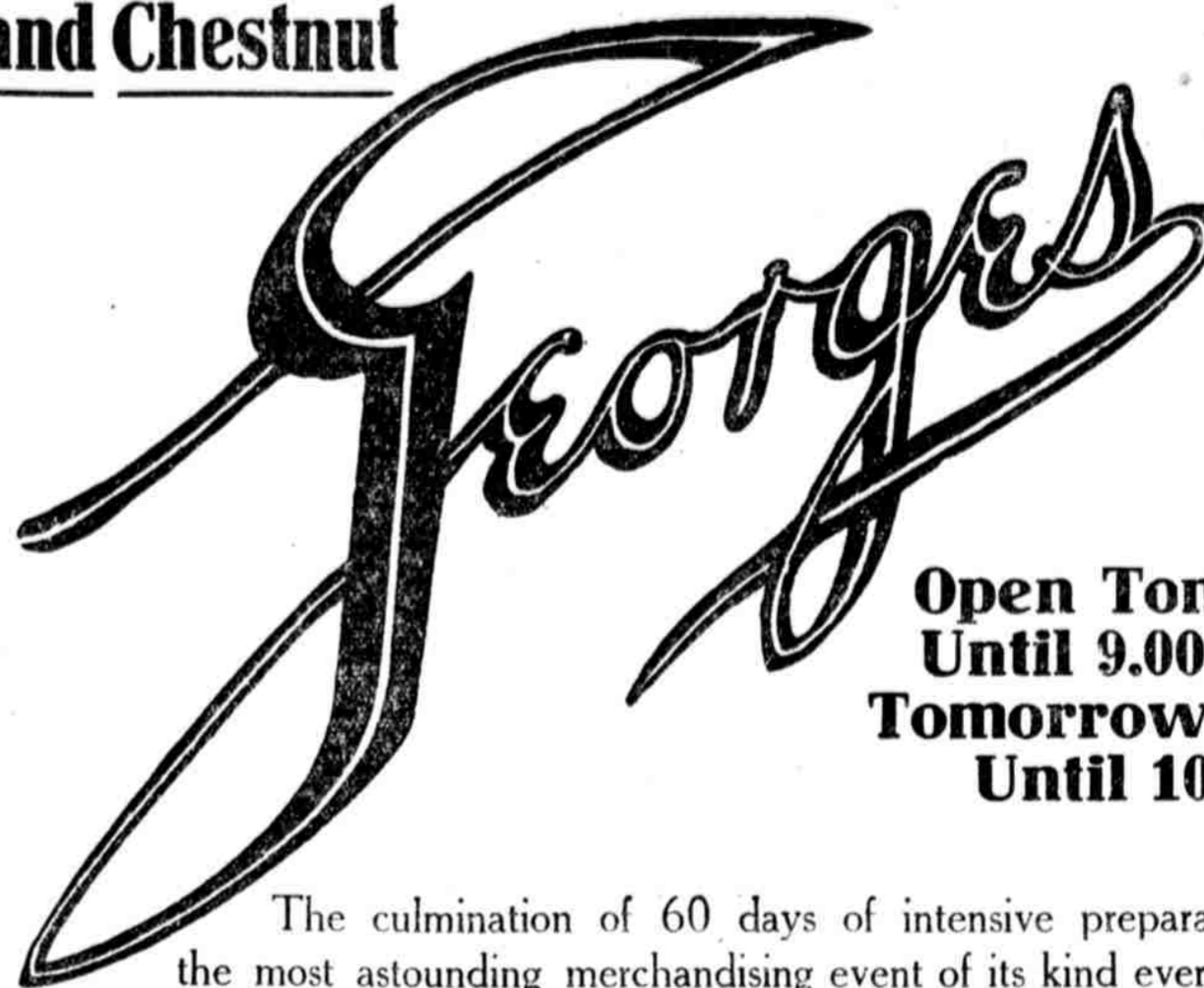

The singles ran to five sets and the doubles to four. The American team, with the exception of Johnston, will play in Australia, returning to the United States by way of the Orient.
