Daily Talks With Thinking Philadelphians on Subjects They Know Best

GEORGE S. BLISS
On the Weatherman's Part
THE Weather Bureau is an important factor
in preserving and regulating the life
of the community, according to George S.
Bliss, meteorologist in charge of the Penn-
sylvania division of the United States
Weather Bureau. This statement may come
as a surprise to those who think of the de-
partment wholly in terms of forecasting.

SOMETHING in the atmosphere of this
town has made for good schools; the
perplexity of the weather has made for
preparatory schools, new high schools and
colleges. A meteorological survey of the
whole country must be made every twelve
hours in order that the forecasters may be
informed of any unusual developments, and
may be enabled to follow them closely.
