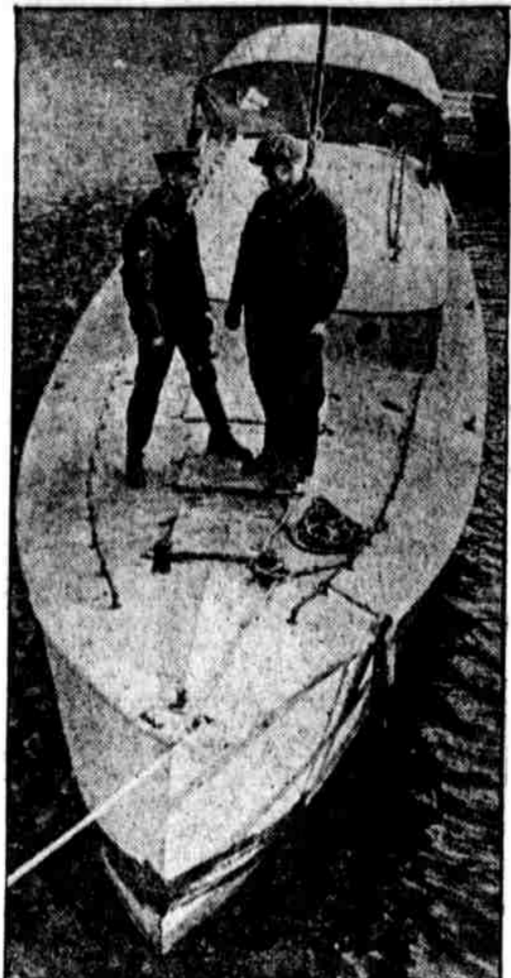




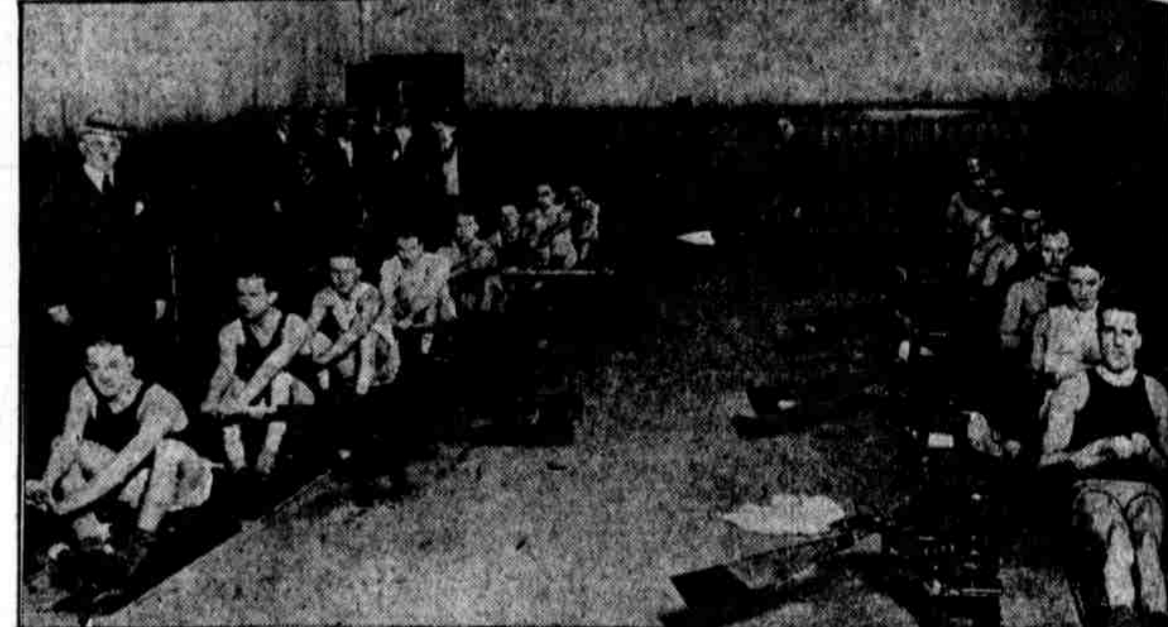

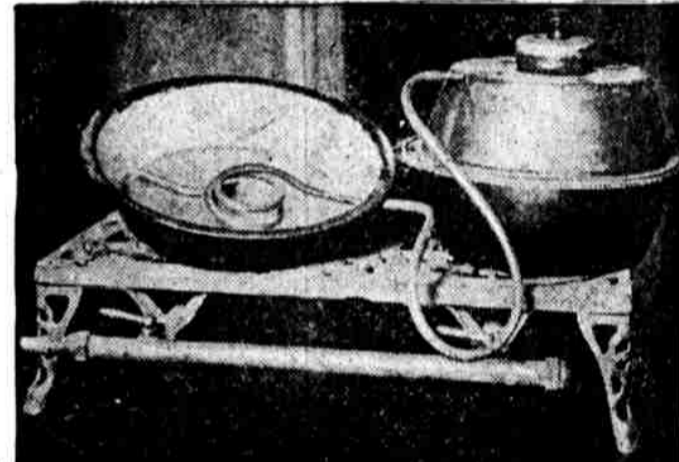

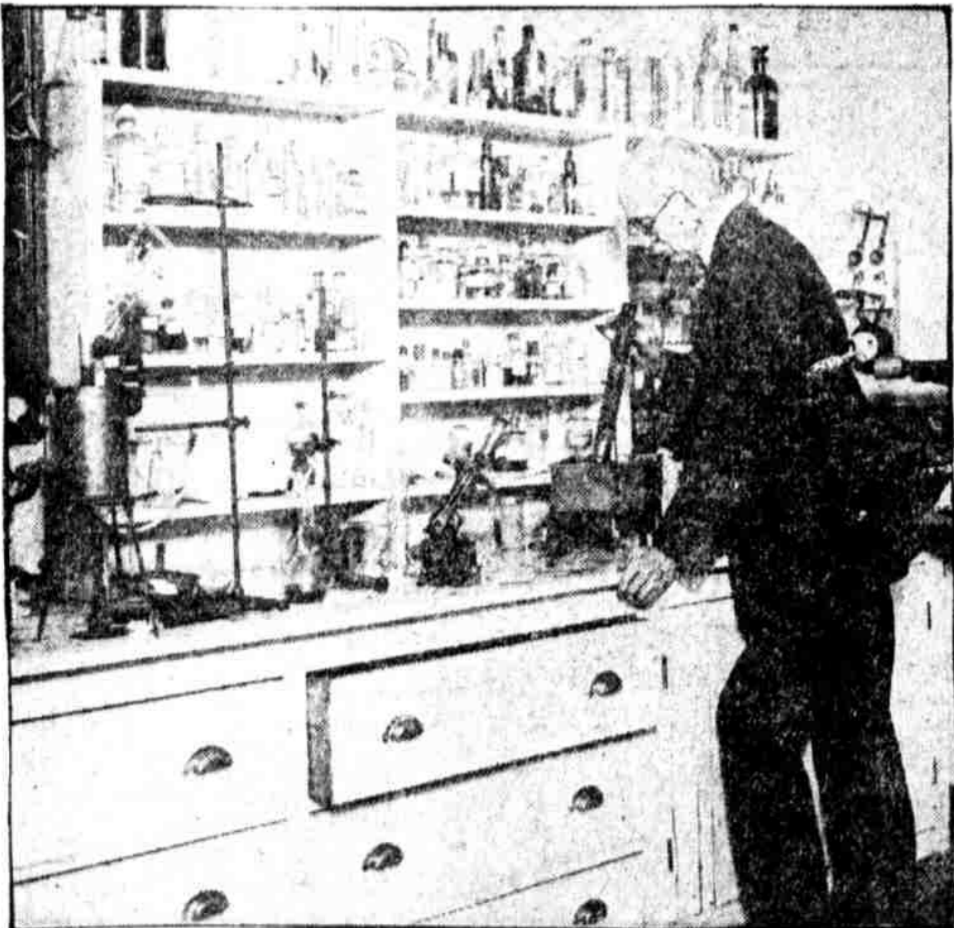

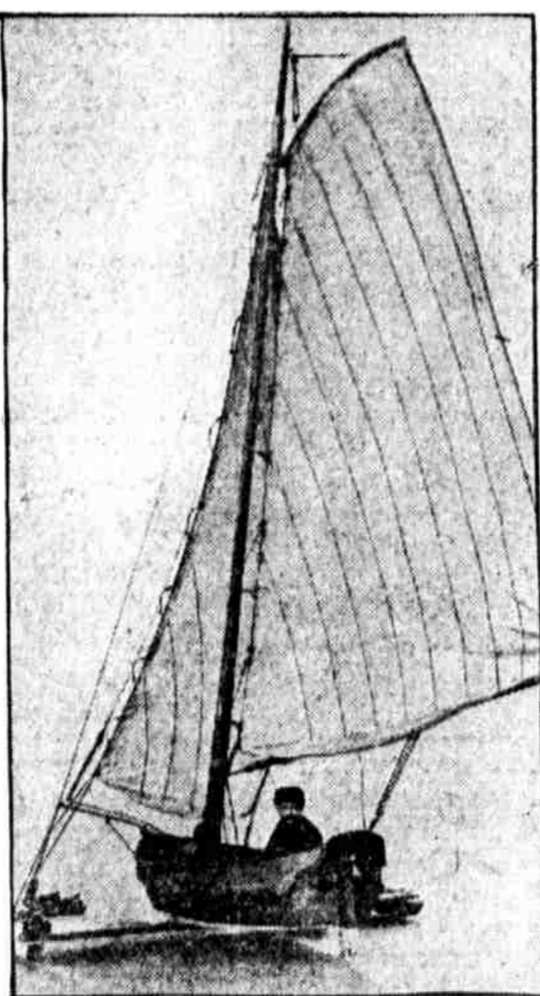


A "BABY STILL." The federal agents who found this device for making "red eye" claim it's the smallest still that has been confiscated. Ledger Photo Service.

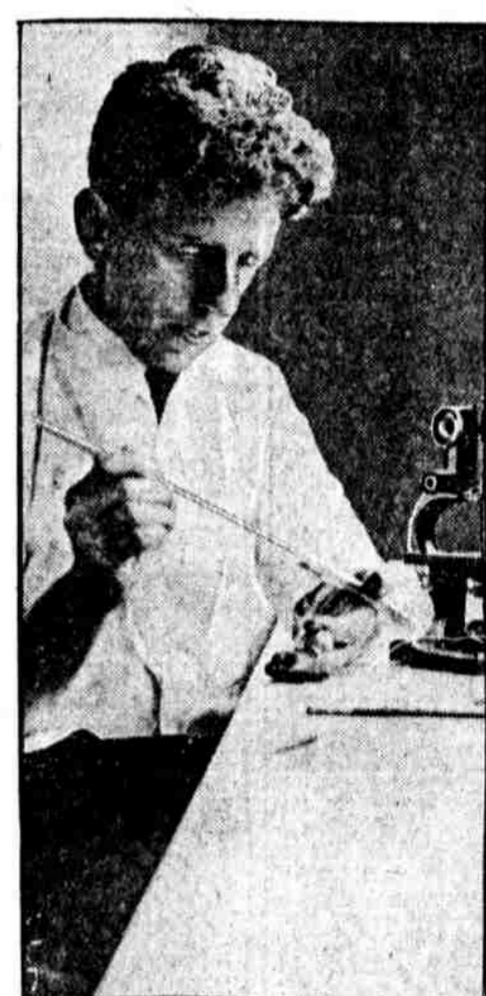
