

HOCKEY MEN TO BE AT PAUL'S FUNERAL

Teammates of Young Athlete to Be Pallbearers at His Funeral

FALL CALLED ACCIDENT

Teammates of Howard Livingston Paul, prominent Main Line athlete, who died in the Presbyterian Hospital as a result of an injury received in a hockey game Saturday at the Ice Palace, will act as pallbearers at his funeral.

Paul, who was twenty-one years old, received what his friends thought was a slight cut on the head in a fall during a match between the Bachelors' Barge Club hockey team, of which he was a member, and the team of the Merion Cricket Club. He died twelve hours later.

The funeral will take place Wednesday morning from his home, 6359 Sherwood road, Overbrook. Services will be conducted by the Rev. Robert Norwood, of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Overbrook. Interment will be at West Laurel Hill Cemetery.

All the members of the Philadelphia Hockey Association, of which Sidney Clark is president, will attend the funeral. Both teams in the fatal match were members of this league.

Paul's former teammates, who may act as pallbearers, are Garrett Gilmore, captain of the team; J. B. Huhn, Samuel P. Huhn, Jr., and Gilbert Passavant, and Harry Curtis and Edward Wals, University of Pennsylvania students.

Alden Lee, captain of the Merion team, said today the death of Paul was purely accidental, and did not result from a fall. Lee, a member of the dead man's team, was with the other members of his team. E. C. Felton, W. S. Newlin, W. W. Kurtz, F. M. Thayer, Phyllis Lee and W. Stroud, will attend the funeral in a body. league this week and no cancellations will be necessary.

Paul attended Haverford school, and later graduated from the Phillips-Andover Academy, going into his father's shoe business, outside of Boston, afterward. He showed prominence along all lines of sport at school. Paul was a member of the Overbrook Golf Club and the Merion Cricket Club. He is survived by his father, mother and younger brother, Cooper.

GLOUCESTER SHOP BURNS

PREACHERS PLACE 'PROPER' IN GOWNS

'Reform' Models to Be Exhibited Banish Low Waists, Short Skirts and Silk Stockings

'HARMFUL,' THEY DECLARE

Women's dresses to be designed by the dress reform committee along lines suggested by numerous clergymen bid fair to recall the days of "back-to-the-ashes." They are to be "models of propriety."

In answer to a questionnaire sent out to more than a thousand ministers, representatives of all denominations, last week, the neck-a-boo waist must go, as must silk stockings, form-fitting clothing, short skirts and low necks, "fore and aft."

So far a great number of returns have been made to the questionnaire. Among them is said to be one from a bishop.

The model dresses will be exhibited at a "bazaar" to be held the week of January 31 to February 5 at St. Agnes' Hospital, Broad and Mifflin streets.

Both the Rev. Edgar C. Young, vicar of Phillips Brooks Memorial Chapel, and the Rev. M. G. Kyle, professor of Xenia Theological Seminary, of St. Louis, say they think the gowns worn by women of today are "morally harmful." Both recommend national agitation as a means of reforming feminine dress.

To the question, "Do you believe women's opportunity for marriage would be less if they did not wear extreme styles?" the Rev. Mr. Young said: "No. Men love women and not the style of their dresses. But, on the other hand, I do not think that women will be willing to change their styles."

As to where women's gowns should end and where begin, the vicar gave the following figures:

"The skirt may be eight or nine inches above the ground; the back of the waist should not be more than three

inches below the neck and the front not more than four inches below the neck; the sleeves should come to the elbow.

Asked if silk stockings were "morally harmful," the clergyman said: "Emphatically yes." The Rev. Mr. Kyle was even less radical in his view of the low neck. He said: "No woman should allow her waist to be open below the neck."
