Sigmund Mendelssohn, a well-known manufacturer, in "Labor's Crisis," gives an employer's view on labor problems. His book, which is meaty rather than lengthy, opens with a definitive chapter on "Poverty and its nature and effect," which leads naturally into consideration of such topics as poverty in relation to labor, labor viewed as a non-commodity and the cost of living.

The writer makes no pretensions to scientific analysis and systematization, but offers his theories out of practical experience. He discusses various proposals existing industrial unrest, suggests many effects and influences of the unrest on production and on labor, and ventures the suggestion that labor scarcity is not entirely due to curtailment in the natural strength of workmen.
