MISSIONARY AIDS FIRE MEN ALL NIGHT

Anna Rose, Nonsectarian Religious Worker, Makes Coffee for Them in Saloon

Sister Anna Rose, a housewife, a missionary who has spent many years helping the "down and outers" of this city, was the heroine of the \$150,000 fire that swept the cotton and waste warehouse at Sixth and Arch streets last night, according to the firemen themselves.

The missionary was on a trolley car on Berks street when she saw the fire last night. She got off and asked firemen for their coffee. They were chaffed and teased her. She had formed on their clothing. So they welcomed the invitation. Sister Rose, finding the saloon proprietor not prepared for serving so many coffee, sent out and bought some and made it herself in the saloon kitchen. She rode in a milk wagon to Thirteenth street and Columbus avenue and got provisions from there.

Two firemen were injured and sent to the hospital, and two others received minor cuts and bruises, which did not prevent them from continuing with their battle against the blaze.
Sister Rose was born and reared in Philadelphia. When two years old she became blind in her right eye. In 1910 she was in an accident, lost the sight of her other eye and was made a cripple. But she declares she was cured by faith and prayer, and has been doing missionary work ever since. She preaches at Ninth and Arch streets from 7 to 12 o'clock every Sunday night. She says many criminals have confessed to her and become Christians.
