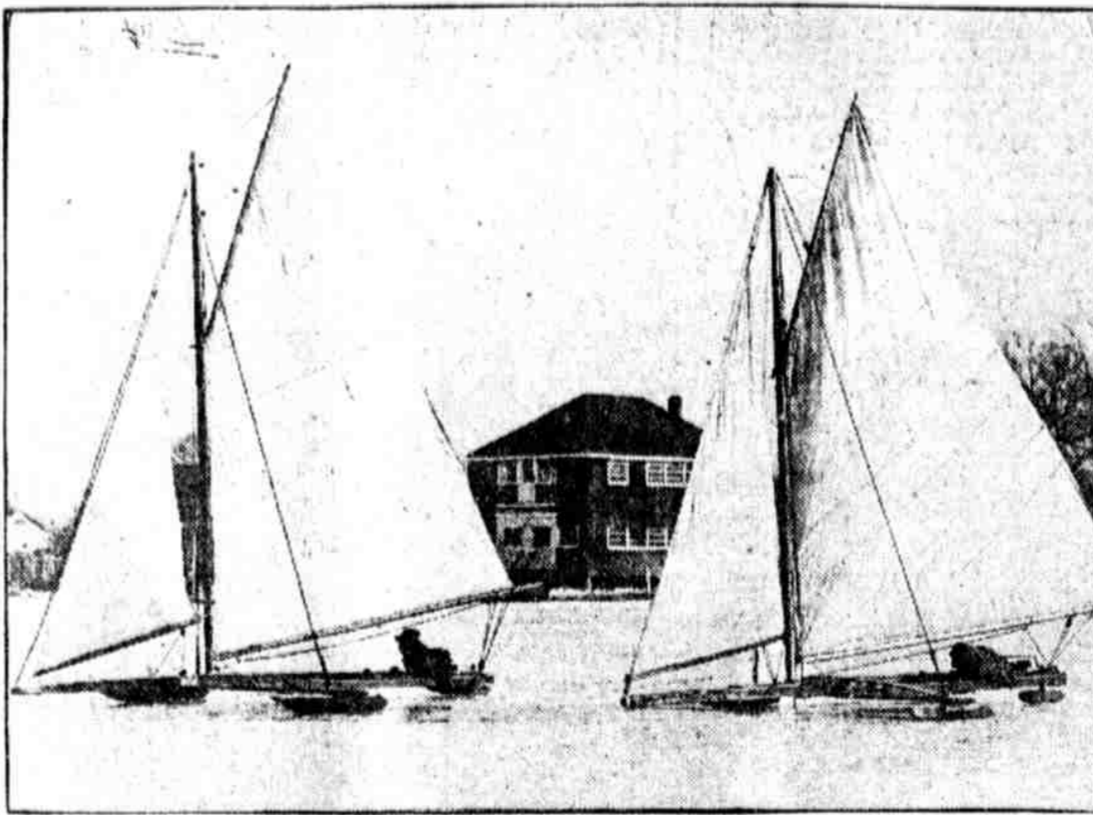




MISS HOPE HAMPTON, the actress, wearing petticoaters, one of the latest creations.

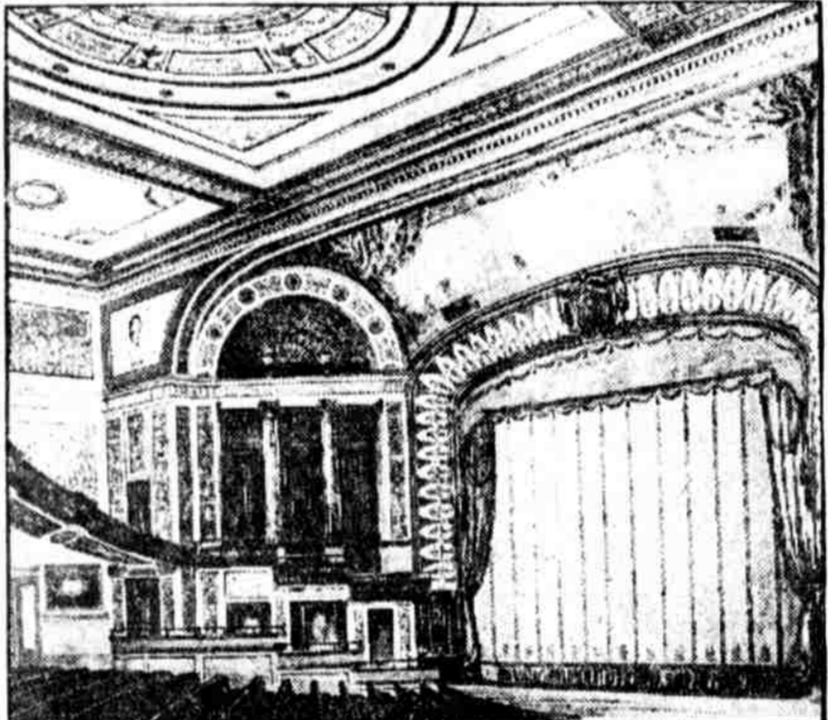

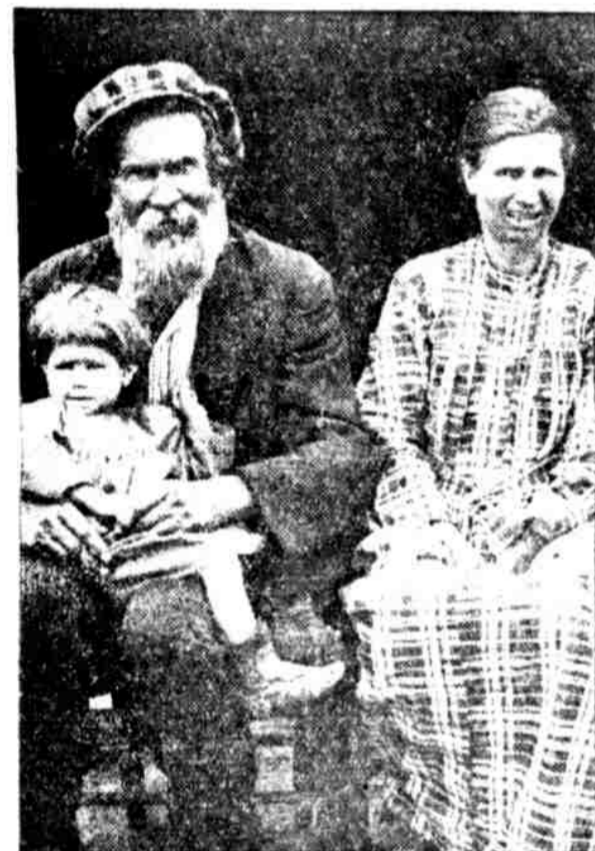

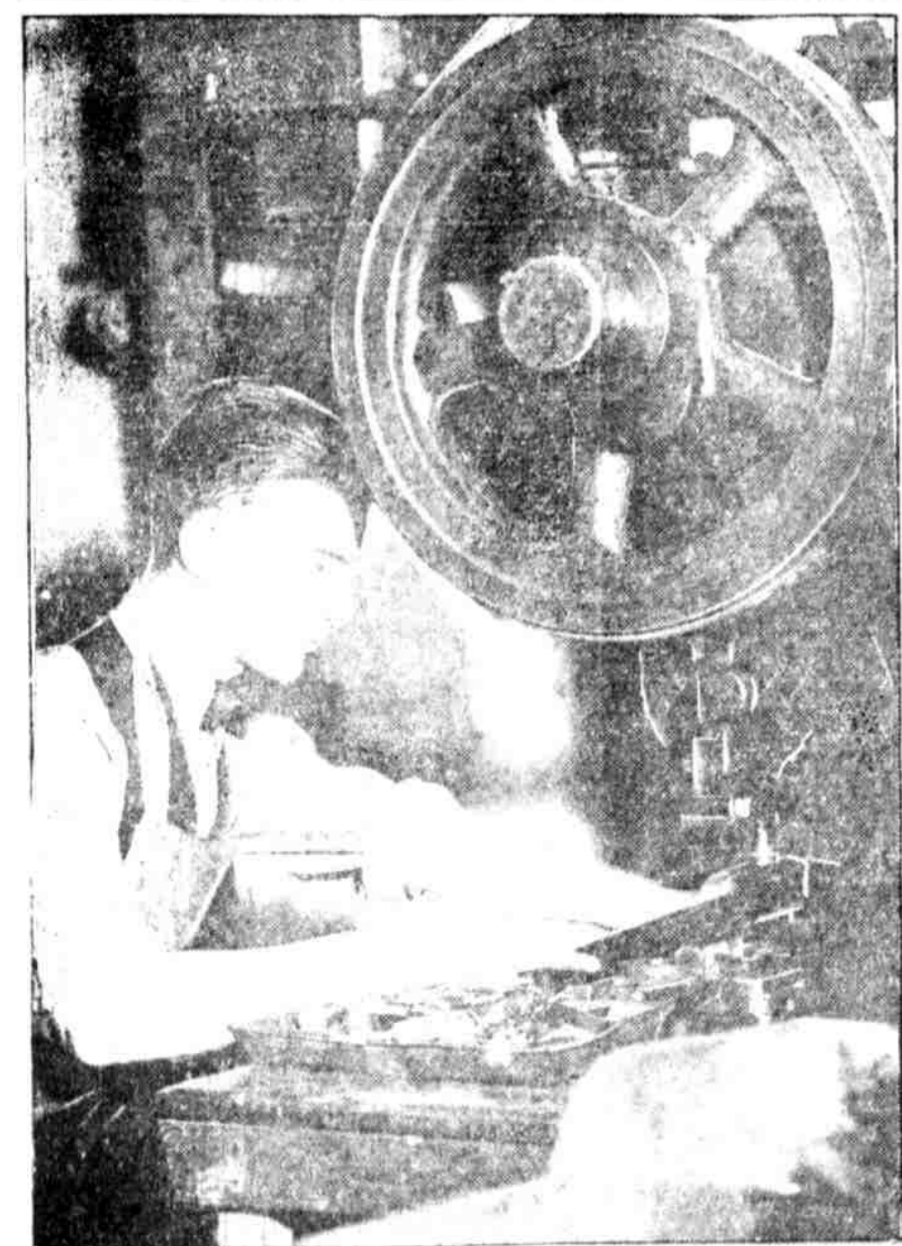
