

MRS. WILSON'S FRENCH SOUPS ARE WELL SEASONED

Perfect Results Also Depend Upon Size of Utensil and Temperature at Which They Are Cooked—Puree of Lentils Among Recipes

LA BONNE FEMME of France makes her puree to suit the season. Puree is made in a puree made of garden vegetables and milk and also a puree made by cooking vegetables in meat stock and then combining with milk.

The French housewife in her kitchen uses a large variety of vegetables and often combines two and three in a puree; for example, carrots, peas and onions. Early spring, the fresh and succulent green vegetables are preferred. They are cooked in the usual manner, very slowly, until sufficiently tender. They are then drained, the stock or water in which they were cooked is set aside and the vegetables are rubbed through a fine sieve.

Lentils, peas and dried beans are usually made into puree. They are usually made with the addition of either salt pork or ham bone cooked in plenty of water until very soft and then rubbed through a fine sieve. Seasoning and the addition added.

Now while I try to give exact proportions for these dishes, a great deal will depend upon the size of the material and the degree of heat used to cook, as well as the moisture content of the vegetables, are important.

In making the puree, small pieces of the contents into three parts: First, The well-drained cooking vegetable. Second, Lentils in water, green peas, cooked and then drained. Third, Milk or stock. Stock or broth is also used to cook the various vegetables.

Puree of Lentils, Beans or Dried Peas. Look over very carefully, wash up of lentils. Wash in plenty of warm water and then drain. Now place in a saucepan and cover with plenty of warm water. Let stand overnight and in the morning, drain and add.

One-half medium size carrots, sliced. One-half medium size onions, sliced. One teaspoon of salt. One-half cup of cold water. Chop the carrots and onions into small pieces. Bring to a boil and then cook slowly until the lentils become mushy. Drain through a fine sieve and then mix the lentils through a sieve. Measure and add to two cups of lentil puree and four cups of liquid in which the lentils were cooked.

Now dissolve: One cup of sugar. One-half cup of cold water. Together and add to the mixture. Heat to mix thoroughly and then mix a half and cook slowly for one half hour. If too thick add more liquid in which the lentils were cooked, or boiling this, sufficient boiling water to make the desired consistency. Any variety of beans, dried peas, split peas, rice and hominy may be used.

Panada Bread Soup. This soup is made in various ways in many parts of Europe. Soak stale bread in plenty of water to soften them the bread in a piece of absorbent cloth and squeeze out the water. Sift the cloth and squeeze out the water. Now rub the bread through a coarse sieve, place two cups of it in a saucepan, and add.

Four cups of water in which bread was soaked. One-half cup of sugar. One-half cup of cold water. Bring to a boil and cook slowly for twenty minutes. Now place in a bowl. Yolk of two eggs. One-half cup of cold water. Beat to mix and then pour into the cooking panada, stirring all.

Puree of Chantrelis. Place in a saucepan. One-half cup of cold water. One-half cup of cold water. Blend the flour in cold milk and stock and bring to a boil. Now add.
