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SEEK TWENTY-ROUND BOUTS

One of Proposed Changes in Minnesota Boxing Law

St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 18.—Several changes in the boxing law of Minnesota will be proposed to the state Legislature, it was announced here today. A measure is being prepared for introduction next week.

It will provide for a new state athletic commission, to be appointed by the governor from among officers of the state National Guard or naval militia; would permit twenty-round bouts to a decision, and limit the price of all seats to a \$3 maximum. Under the present law ten-round, no decision contests are permitted.

National Guard units would be the chief promoting clubs and "night clubs" as such would be permitted.
