NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—(By A. P.)—Herbert Hoover has not yet been asked to become a member of President-elect Harding's cabinet and his friends believe the Department of Commerce will be given to Mr. Hoover as the public institutions with which he is now connected, said a statement issued here today by George Barr Baker, identified with Mr. Hoover as a relief worker. Mr. Baker's statement follows:

"Mr. Hoover has not been asked to enter the cabinet of President-elect Harding. Furthermore, Mr. Hoover stated some time ago that he had no desire for political office and felt that he could be of greater public service outside than inside the cabinet. He was advising that the Department of Commerce offers no such field for constructive work as do the public institutions with which he is now associated.
