"It discriminates against labor, especially as who worked at Hog Island or in american war industries, and who were id that their services were more valuable the government in such influstries than the army. It also discriminates against armers, who were given deferred classificion because of the urgent needs of ops.

"It destroys the right of policemen and fremen to promotion for service and merit; the line of duty. Many of our golicemen and firemen remained at their posts, elieving that it was important that our ties and public works should be protected by trained men. If this bill should pass, any policemen or firemen who had been a futbful member of the force for years would find his chance of promotion leavied, if not lost, by reason of the preferate given to's new veterant recruit.




