

**GIVE BUSINESS FREE  
LAND, MAYOR URGES**

**He Tells Bronx Board of Trade  
Government Should In-  
terfere Less**

**WOULD CUT RED TAPE**

"The time has come when the govern-  
ment should do less business itself and  
let the business men do it himself,"  
Mayor Moore declared in an address at  
the twenty-seventh annual dinner of the  
Board of Trade in the Hotel  
Astor, New York city, last night.

Mayor Moore came out definitely for  
a simplification of wartime regulations  
and told the New York business men  
the principles underlying his inter-  
pretation of sound municipal govern-  
ment. He spoke on the subject "How a Large  
City May be Run Successfully."

Turning for the moment to a consid-  
eration of national problems, he said:  
"We have too many war trade boards  
and on the government map. We have  
too many shipping boards, federal  
trade commissions and organizations  
making it preferential for some lines of

activity and extremely difficult for  
others to do business."

**Says Change It Off to Himself**  
"Some of us believe that the United  
States should restore our relations with  
Europe and establish peace with Ger-  
many so we may carry on trade with  
that country. This has not been done  
and we seem to be the only country still  
at war. Officers have something decided  
upon a peace which we have for diplo-  
matic, sentimental or some other rea-  
son kept ourselves from getting.

"The time is here when government  
should do less business itself and let  
the business men do it himself. Repre-  
sents of the United States civil service  
last July we still were paying over  
a half cent of the country for  
every 100 people of the entire popula-  
tion. Hence the question arises whether  
the time has not come not only to cut  
the war red tape, but also to cut down  
the personnel and let the men working  
for the government go back to the farms  
and into the heap where they are so sorely  
needed."

**Cites His Own Policy**  
"The Mayor also related how his ad-  
ministration had laid down the rule  
that a municipality can be run suc-  
cessfully on a policy of civic economy,  
and how by instructing officers of the  
law—police and firemen—that they  
were not to meddle in politics, by cap-  
turing the money of unscrupulous con-  
tractors, he was unable to stand on  
the record of the thirteen months of  
his administration.

"A municipality can be run suc-  
cessfully on a platform of civic economy,  
not a platform of politics, nor a platform  
of the professional reformer," he said.  
"The Mayor knows that he is getting full  
value for every dollar he pays as tax-  
payer into the city treasury."
