

PHYSICIAN BEATS TWO MALE FLIRTS

Attacks Men Who Accosted His Wife and Woman Friend on Street

BOTH GO TO HOSPITAL

Armed with a stick he had picked up at a building entrance, Dr. George H. Irvine, 5629 Pine street, early yesterday knocked down two young men who, he said, accosted Mrs. Irvine and a woman companion at Fifty-second and Pine streets.

Dr. Irvine testified before Magistrate Harris in the Third second street and Woodland avenue station at the hearing of Walter Hogan, twenty-four years old, Fifty-fourth street near Warrington avenue, Hogan, charged with assault and battery, who held the stick for a further hearing next Monday.

Hogan's alleged companion Harry Szwajgert, twenty-three years old, Fifty-fourth street near Warrington avenue, is in the Alseverston Hospital under arrest. It is said he is suffering from the shaking palsy.

According to the testimony, Dr. and Mrs. Irvine were on a motor trip with Mr. and Mrs. Charles Laskowski, 5021 Larchwood avenue. They returned early yesterday and stored the physician's car in a garage at Fifty-second and Ludlow streets.

While the machine was being placed in the garage Mrs. Irvine and Mrs. Laskowski walked southward on Fifty-second street.

At Pine street, Dr. Irvine testified, two men in a parked machine accosted the women and asked them to get into the machine. Dr. Irvine and Mr. Laskowski had left the garage and heard the invitation.

When Dr. Irvine manifested that he would not obey the invitation, the physician picked up a short, heavy stick. As Szwajgert approached, the physician swung the stick down on the young man's head, Szwajgert fell.

It was testified Hogan struck Dr. Irvine, who swung the stick again. Hogan fell. The physician said Hogan down a road. Dr. Irvine struck the man's arm and knocked the weapon from his grasp. A man in the arm was broken.

Hogan and Szwajgert were taken to the hospital. Later Hogan was taken to the city house.

It is presumed the children had a strenuous history of being picked up and in favor of which the relatives evidently knew nothing. Now it is necessary to locate the youngsters. The money belongs to the children and the insurance company wants to pay the claim.
