

WEAPONS LICENSE BILL AIMS TO CHECK BANDITRY

Measure Drawn by Smyth Gives Police Power Over Permits By a Staff Correspondent

Harrisburg, March 1.—Licensing of gun toters to halt the wave of banditry is proposed in a bill drafted by City Solicitor Smyth, of Philadelphia, and introduced in the House by Representa-tive Franklin. The bill is expected to receive the full support of the Moore administration.
It applies to blackjacks, brass knuckles and all forms of deadly

knuckles and all forms of deadly weapons which can be concealed.

The bill specifies that to carry any such weapons outside of the home requires a license to be granted by the police authorities after proper examination. A fee of \$1 is provided for the issuance of the license.

Violation of the act would be punishable by a fine of from \$100, to \$500 and imprisonment of from six months to two years, or both. Any person refused a license by the police authorities has the right to appeal to the court.
